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### Brief Description

The Civil Society Democratic Governance Facility (Amkeni Wakenya) is a civil society strengthening project of UNDP. It was established in 2008 to provide coordinated support to Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) in the democratic governance sector in Kenya to enable them to participate more effectively in reform processes in the country. In the second phase, the facility implemented projects in 16 counties with support from the Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands (EKN), Embassy of Japan, The European Union (EU) and the Embassy of Norway. The current phase has commenced with support from UNDP, the EU and the EKN, and resource mobilization efforts will continue in the year and the entire implementation period.

This Annual Work Plan (AWP) is aligned with the Country Programme Document (CPD) 2022-2026, by entrenching a rights-based approach towards enhancing access to justice and promotion of rule of law. The AWP is in line with and based on the UNDP's Global Strategic Plan 2022-2025 and in particular, the UNDP's global signature solution of strengthening effective, inclusive and accountable governance, ensuring inclusion of women, youth people with disabilities and other traditionally marginalized groups. It is guided by the Government's priorities as outlined in Medium Term Plan (MTP)- IV, which has identified the provision of legal aid by non-state actors as one of the flagship interventions. The Programme will contribute to the first outcome of the UN Sustainable Development Co-operation Framework (UNSDCF) 2022- 2026 by promoting civil society engagement to ensure equitable access to opportunities and a rights-based approach to human agency and human development.

### Overall Objectives and Expected Outcomes

The overall objective of Amkeni Wakenya project is to promote human rights-centred governance in Kenya by empowering CSOs to advocate on matters relating to civic engagement on human rights, democratic governance and enabling environment for civil society. The facility pursues this by providing financial and technical assistance to CSOs particularly those working at the county-level and with the grassroots communities. Through such assistance, the target CSOs are in turn able to empower citizens to demand their rights and influence public policies, laws and institutions in respective thematic areas of focus. Amkeni also seeks to support CSOs in improving their own institutional, technical and financial capacities, as well as the enabling environment (policy and regulatory frameworks) for the CSOs. Amkeni Wakenya's Project Document for Phase II was adopted in 2015 and now has been extended to 2023.

Amkeni Wakenya seeks to support basic rights and address barriers to access to justice, particularly among the marginalized and the poor in at least 18 counties of Kenya (Nairobi, Kisumu, Mombasa, Uasin Gishu, Nakuru, Kitui, Kilifi, Turkana, Wajir, Mandera, Garissa, Tana River, Lamu, Kwale, Isiolo, Turkana, Laikipia, and Marsabit). The project also seeks to promote citizen engagement and participation in the devolved system of governance underpinned by the human rights-based approach to development. Key actions contemplated in this project are to be implemented through CSOs. However, capacities of CSOs in Kenya are uneven, disproportionately spread thinly in rural areas and operating in an inadequate enabling environment. The capabilities of these organizations to respond to evolving governance issues is limited due to financial and technical constraints. Further, under the new EKN partnership, UNDP will continue to promote an enabling civic space and therefore strengthen the ability of civil society organizations (CSOs) in holding governments and the private sector accountable for the realization of SGDs.

In 2023, Amkeni Wakenya will focus on four (4) outcome areas:

1. Enhancing Access to Justice and Realization of Human Rights.
2. Promoting organizational performance, sustainability an enabling environment for CSOs.
3. Enhancing capacity of CSOs to respond to emerging contemporary governance issues; and
4. Strengthening Amkeni Wakenya's Project capacity to support CSOs effectively and efficiently in Kenya.

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Amkeni Wakenya will use grant making, capacity building, learning and knowledge management methodologies to channel financial and technical support to CSOs.

In addition to the 18 target counties, the project has established subnational presence in 2 field offices in Wajir and Mombasa in 2019 through which project interventions will be administered in a decentralized manner. Plans to open the third field office in Kisumu is at the tail end.

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## **1.0 Project Context**

Amkeni Wakenya is now in its first year of the third Phase of the project. The project is domiciled in UNDP's Governance and Inclusive Growth (GiG) Unit. Whereas the project management unit (PMU) of Amkeni is based within the UNDP Kenya Country Office (KCO) in Gigiri Nairobi, field offices are now operational in Mombasa and Wajir, serving the coastal and Northern Kenya regions respectively. The Amkeni Wakenya End Term Evaluation (2015-2022) aimed at assessing the overall impact of the project during the 2<sup>nd</sup> Phase while also identifying the challenges encountered, and the lessons learnt during implementation. The evaluation identified gaps and recommendations that needed to be addressed in the new cycle. These gaps included the need to expand the inclusion space to incorporate people with disabilities (PWDs) as well as targeting and including children focused organizations in the programming. Further, the evaluation recommended the need to scale up projects on Sexual and gender based violence (SGBV) and also strengthen legal awareness and education. All these recommendations have been sufficiently captured in this AWP as well as the PRODOC.

The following key developments characterize the broader context for the Amkeni project in 2023.

### **New Programme for Legal Empowerment and AID Delivery in Kenya- PLEAD II**

The contribution agreement with European Union expired on March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2023. A new cooperation agreement between (PLEAD II) EU, UNDP and UNODC was approved in December 2022. Under the PLEAD II design, UNDP-Amkeni Wakenya will continue its coverage in the 12 PLEAD I focal counties. The programme will focus on both the demand side and supply side of access to justice and anti-corruption - focusing on the youth, women, children, and the vulnerable groups and will really on the ability of UNDP unique capacity to reach out to these identified groups through the CSOs. In this regard UNDP will continue working with the Court User Committees, legal aid clinics, justice advisory centres and the small claims court. To ensure sustainability of the legal aid centres, the already established legal aid centres will collaborate with the National Legal Aid services (NLAS). Under PLEAD II, UNDP will continue working with the academia in an effort to contribute to knowledge management. Finally PLEAD II will continue to contribute towards improving the enabling environment of the CSOs through the ongoing work with the NGO Coordination Board.

### **Operationalization of the PBO Act 2013 under the new administration**

Kenya held its general election in 2022 and ushered a new government under His Excellency Dr. William Ruto as the fifth president of Kenya. The new administration has committed to operationalising the PBO Act and expanding space for NGO- Government partnerships and collaboration. This presents an opportunity for the CSO actors to follow up on this commitment. Amkeni Wakenya will work with all the partners including the CSOs and the NGO Coordination Board in working towards actualizing this commitment.

## **2.0 Overview of the 2023 AWP**


Amkeni's interventions for 2023 will continue to entail promoting human rights and access to justice, enhancing the CSO civic space as well as an enabling environment for civil society. Even though Kenya has arguably the most vibrant civil society in the region, the enabling environment is regarded as inadequate, due to slow alignment of the existing regulatory framework with the 2010 Constitution. The Public Benefits Authority Act of 2013 is yet to be operationalized and hence the rather outdated NGO Coordination Act of 1990 remains the governing law for most CSOs. There was a transition in the top leadership of the CSO regulator, the NGO Board in 2018 and this has raised

optimism that the CSO-State relations could improve in the short-term with increased prospects for eventual implementation of the PBO Act. With funding from the Embassy of the Kingdom of Netherlands, the project will support 10 CSOs across four target counties to implement interventions geared towards enhancing an enabling environment for CSOs operation and thus strengthening the ability of civil society organizations (CSOs) in holding governments and the private sector accountable for the realization of SGDs.

In 2023, Amkeni Wakenya will leverage on the expansion of digital technology to enhance administration of justice in Kenya with a goal to realize access to justice particularly for the poor and marginalized. Amkeni purposes to achieve this through supporting the knowledge management platform between institutions of higher learning, State (support digital uptake of access to justice through applications linked to a case management system covering small claim courts) and non-state actors as well as supporting the Small Clams Courts in awareness creation and sensitization on the mandate of the Small Claims Court through quarterly public forums. This is informed by the need to reach the farthest first and address the need of the most vulnerable and working with the newly launched Small Claims Courts while also furthering partnership with the National Steering Committee on Implementation-Alternative Justice System (NaSCI-AJS) towards entrenching ICT enabled Courts and AJS panels to address the most urgent but also to expedite justice for all as means of relieving the ever-growing case backlog.

The cost of implementation of the 2023 AWP is estimated at \$ USD 2,968,130. EU through UNODC is expected to fund 52% of 2023 AWP, whereas EKN and Global Programme for Strengthening Rule of Law (GP4) will contribute 27% and 8% respectively.


