2. PERFORMANCE REVIEW

2.1 Monitoring and Evaluation Activities

A **mid-term survey** was conducted by KOICA's M&E consultant team covering two of the four project areas (East Lima and Cajamarca), combining primary data collection through face-to-face and telephone surveys with the review of administrative records. The survey assessed progress against four project outcome indicators related to the attention of gender-based violence (GBV) cases by peace judges, user satisfaction, and the articulation between peace justice and ordinary justice system.

Data collection was carried out between June 30 and July 30, 2025, covering three target groups: peace judges, women affected by GBV and ordinary justice operators (judges, prosecutors and police). A total of 191 people participated in the survey, including 100 peace judges (30 from Lima Este and 70 from Cajamarca), 45 women affected by GBV (30 from Lima Este and 15 from Cajamarca), and 46 ordinary justice operators (16 from Lima Este and 30 from Cajamarca). Data from peace judges was collected through self-administered questionnaires, focusing on severe GBV cases attended during the period of June 2022–May 2025.

On October 28th, the M&E consultant team presented the preliminary results of the mid-term study to the Judiciary and UNDP. On October 29th, KOICA shared the results for comments from UNDP and the Judiciary. UNDP provided technical observations on November 10th and December 7th. Finally, the final mid-term survey report was formally shared with UNDP on January 9th, 2026.

2.2 Overall Project Results

During the reporting period (January–December 2025¹), the project consolidated key advances under both outcomes, focusing on strengthening peace judges' attention of GBV cases; deepening interinstitutional coordination for violence prevention and response; advancing digital justice innovation through the consolidation of SISJUPAZ; and promoting women's leadership and intercultural dialogue in the administration of justice.

Below is a summary of the overall project results at the outcome level for the reporting period:

Outcome 1: Improved access of rural women victims of gender-based violence to peace justice in the Andean areas of four judicial districts

Progress under this outcome is reflected in the **strengthening of capacities of peace judges and local actors** to ensure timely, gender-responsive and culturally appropriate responses to gender-based violence in rural territories. The project consolidated a **specialized training model for peace judges** that combined in-person, decentralized workshops with continuous follow-up, ensuring practical application of learning in real cases. In parallel, the **exchange and recognition of good practices** contributed to consolidating innovative local initiatives and generating a multiplier effect among

diverse community and institutional actors. Through the **Women Who Transform initiative**, 4 women's organizations from the project's target regions strengthened and implemented community-based actions to prevent and address gender-based violence in rural and indigenous settings, reinforcing women's leadership, community engagement and coordination with peace justice.

Outcome 2: Improved visibility and strengthened institution of peace justice regarding gender-based violence

Progress under this outcome focused on enhancing the visibility and institutional strength of peace justice in addressing gender-based violence. In that regard, the collective and decentralized development, validation and institutionalization of technical instruments and coordination mechanisms to address gender-based violence has been key. **5 referral pathways** were approved at district, provincial and regional levels; as well as **guidelines for coordination between peace justice, the police and health services** with 5 documents issued formalizing their local implementation in Huancaavelica, Junín and Cajamarca, enhancing role clarity and articulation among peace judges, municipal governments, police, health services and other state actors in rural areas. Additionally, the **pedagogical and intercultural adaptation of the Risk Assessment Form** was finalized and has proven to be fundamental to support its effective use by peace judges in rural contexts.

Institutional strengthening efforts also focused on the **launch, formal institutionalization, and pilot implementation of the Unified Peace Justice System (SISJUPAZ)**, enabling digital case registration for more than 1,200 peace judges across four judicial districts and advancing interoperability with national systems. To support sustainability and future scaling, a Training of Trainers (ToT) strategy was initiated with ONAJUP, ODAJUP, and Judiciary IT staff; however, further efforts are required to fully institutionalize the system. In this regard, sustained technical and institutional accompaniment, led by the Judiciary's IT Office and ONAJUP, is essential to support change management processes, address connectivity and access barriers to internal platforms, and consolidate teams of trained system facilitators in each judicial district, ensuring its effective use, sustainability, and scalability.

2.3 Performance during the reporting period

2.3.1. Key Achievements

Output 1.1 Enhanced gender awareness and response of peace justice for women victims of gender-based violence with a gender and intercultural approach

During the reporting period, activities focused on the implementation of the **specialized training course for peace judges**, implemented by DESCOCENTRO in coordination with ONAJUP and the ODAJUP offices.

In addition, efforts to **increase women's participation as peace judges** included the organization of national and subnational events bringing together women peace judges and ordinary judges, as well as the formal recognition of women peace judges through institutional ceremonies and administrative resolutions that acknowledged their trajectories, leadership, and contributions to access to justice and the prevention of gender-based violence in commemoration of the International Day of Women Judges (March 10).

Activity 1.1.1 Conduct a situation analysis with a gender and intercultural approach to understand the response of peace judges to gender-based violence.

Activity 1.1.2. Develop gender awareness training programs for peace judges based on the results of the situation analysis

Activity 1.1.3. Implement gender awareness training for peace judges

The project made significant progress in the implementation of the **training course "Strengthening the capacities of peace judges to address cases of violence against women and family members."** A total of **491 peace judges (402 men and 89 women)** participated in the training from the judicial districts of Cajamarca, Junín, Huancavelica and Lima Este.

In January 2025, UNDP signed a contract with DESCOCENTRO to deliver the training in coordination with the Judiciary (CJG and ONAJUP). The final work plan, incorporating inputs from UNDP, the CJG and ONAJUP, was formally presented and approved on March 7, 2025

Following the approval of the work plan, coordination meetings were held with ODAJUP offices in each judicial district to finalize the training schedule and identify the participating peace judges. The implementation of the course began in May 2025.

The training includes four sequential modules³, combining in-person sessions with virtual follow-up and individual assignments, ensuring continuity and the practical application of learning in real cases. The modules address the following core learning dimensions:

- Module I – The role of peace justice in addressing gender-based violence: understanding gender inequalities, cultural diversity, and effective communication with victims.
- Module II – Protection and risk assessment: applying the Risk Assessment Form approved by the Judiciary to evaluate and ensure the safety of victims.
- Module III – Decisions, sanctions and reparations: strengthening decision-making and coordination with community and institutional actors to ensure accountability and reparation.
- Module IV – Local coordination for access to justice: strengthening articulation between peace justice, ordinary justice and community actors to ensure effective referral and joint action in cases of violence.

As of December 2025, closure workshops were still under implementation and expected to be completed in January 2026 in Cajamarca. Completion of these workshops will consolidate interinstitutional coordination mechanisms and reinforce linkages between peace justice and ordinary justice.

The training apply a socio-critical, participatory and context-sensitive methodology, integrating case analysis, problem-based learning, role-playing simulations, mapping of local actors and guided reflection. This approach enables peace judges to link legal frameworks—particularly Law No. 30364—with their lived realities and local knowledge in diverse cultural and territorial contexts.

In addition, in the framework of **UNDP Insider Mediators Global Training Programme**, UNDP Peru supported the participation of four peace judges from the project’s intervention areas in the Training Programme on Mediation and Consensus-Building⁴, implemented in November 2025 in partnership

with the Antonio Ruiz de Montoya University (UARM), as part of its efforts to strengthen locally led mediation and peaceful conflict management in rural and intercultural contexts.

The training strengthened participants' capacities to address local disputes through dialogue, consensus-building and gender-sensitive mediation, reinforcing their role as trusted community mediators. Through this experience, peace judges acquired practical tools in conflict analysis, communication and trust-building, while engaging in peer-to-peer learning with mediators from other countries, contributing to the development of networks for inclusive and community-based conflict resolution.

Building on this initiative, the project supported the development of a podcast under the EU–UNDP partnership on Insider Mediation⁵, aimed at positioning peace judges alongside other local mediation leaders from different countries. The podcast will be promoted through a three-month social media campaign starting in January 2026, increasing the visibility of peace judges as trusted community mediators at global level.

Activity 1.1.4. Propose measures to promote women's participation as peace judges, including holding national and international meetings, to share best practices and lessons learned

In commemoration of International Women's Day (8 March) and the International Day of Women Judges (10 March), the project supported a set of coordinated actions at national and local levels, leading to the **recognition of more than 20 women peace judges** and contributing to greater visibility of their leadership and experiences. Key activities included:

- **Lima – Testimonial Photo Exhibition “Women in Peace Justice”⁶:**
With support from the Municipality of Miraflores, the project organized a photo exhibition highlighting the history of peace justice in Peru and the contributions of women peace judges to preventing and addressing violence. The exhibition featured testimonies from 4 women peace judges—Bertha de la Cruz (Huancavelica), Lidia Lapierre (Junín), Heidrum Flores (Lima Este), and Socorro Arteaga (Cajamarca)—and was inaugurated with the participation of high-level authorities from the Judiciary, Miraflores Municipality, KOICA, and UNDP.

Approximately 40 people attended the opening, which included a guided visit led by the women peace judges themselves. As the exhibition was held in an open public space, the total number of visitors could not be quantified. For further information see Annex 2 - Success Story.

The District Municipality of Hualhuas issued a **Mayoral Resolution No. 028-2025-A/MDH recognizing women peace judge** Martha Calderón Córdova for her efforts to prevent violence against women⁷.

- **Huancavelica:**
The Superior Court of Justice recognized 21 women peace judges through **Administrative Resolution No. 000274-2025-P-CSJHU-PJ**, issued in commemoration of the International Day of Women Judges⁸.
- **Cajamarca:**
On March 7th, the Superior Court of Justice held an event “Mujeres que Inspiran: Su Voz Transforma la Justicia”⁹, attended by 8 women peace judges, whose participation was facilitated by the project.

Output 1.2 Enhanced gender awareness and response to gender-based violence in the community with a gender and intercultural approach

Activities under this output aimed at **enhancing coordination and fostering mutual understanding between peace judges, women leaders, women’s organizations, and community authorities** to improve prevention and responses to gender-based violence (GBV) in rural and intercultural settings.

The third edition of the **Women Who Transform innovation challenge was launched and awarded** four women’s organizations (FEREMUAH in Huancavelica, Juntos de la Mano Contigo in Junín, the Red Nacional de Promoción de la Mujer in Cajamarca, and the Comedor Popular Señor de Huamantanga de Huariqueña in East Lima) that implemented initiatives to prevent and address GBV across their territories.

Two events were held in Lima reflecting in the importance of rooted and intercultural responses to GBV. First, the **Encounter between Peace Justice and Community and Rondero Justice**, which brought together peace judges, communal and ronda leaders, and women’s organizations to present, exchange, and validate locally developed coordination proposals aimed at improving community-based responses to violence. Additionally, the **international seminar “Justice in Debate: Interculturality in the Face of Gender-Based Violence”**, convened more than 80 national and international specialists and State representatives, providing a high-level space for reflection on the challenges of ensuring access to justice for indigenous and rural women and highlighting the importance of strengthening intercultural approaches within justice systems.

Activity 1.2.1 Conduct an analysis on the current status of community networks, particularly rural women’ networks, to respond to gender-based violence.

Achieved and reported in 2022.

Activity 1.2.2 Strengthen women's networks to promote their involvement in responding to gender-based violence at the local level, within the framework of a collaborative and participatory dialogue with peace justice.

In April 2025, the project launched the third and final edition of the **Women Who Transform innovation challenge**, designed to strengthen women's organizations working to prevent and respond to gender-based violence (GBV) in rural and intercultural areas, while promoting closer collaboration with peace justice.

This edition included two separate calls for proposals¹⁰: one for Cajamarca, Junín, and Huancavelica, and another targeted specifically to Lima Este to address low participation rates in previous editions and better adapt the process to the context of Huarochiri province.

A total of 15 proposals were received — 3 from Cajamarca, 4 from Huancavelica, 5 from Junín, and 3 from East Lima. An evaluation committee composed of Christian Hernández (Judiciary), Clea Guerra (CLADEM), and Karim Velasco and Doris Huando (UNDP) selected four winning organizations, each awarded USD 2,000 to implement initiatives aimed at strengthening local women's networks, enhancing sustainability, and promoting collaborative work with peace justice.

The implementation phase of the four winning initiatives ran from August to December 2025¹¹. Technical assistance was provided by the project team throughout the implementation. The most relevant achievements are presented below:

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Additionally, the following activities were organized under this output:

- Four itinerant dialogues in East Lima with the participation of 50 women leaders and peace judges.
- The **II Regional Gathering of Women Leaders and Peace Judges “Allin ruwayninchikuna, derechunchikta amachanapaq” in Huancavelica**, brought together more than 110 participants from all seven provinces. The workshop provided a space to review progress on the common agenda established in 2023 and propose the Regional Women Agenda 2026-2029¹², strengthening alliances between women leaders and peace judges and promoting women’s participation in communal leadership and peace justice.

Looking ahead to 2026, preparations have begun for the **National Gathering of Women Leaders and Peace Judges**, to be held in May 2026 with the participation of approximately 80 women from across the country. This event will provide a national platform for strengthening women’s leadership, fostering peer exchange, and positioning the role of women peace judges within broader community justice systems.

Activity 1.2.3 – Promote the articulation of community authorities with peace judges to respond to gender-based violence.

Between May and July 2025, a total of **15 workshops were organized across the four judicial districts** with the participation of 332 representatives from community organizations, rondero authorities, and peace judges. These workshops focused on identifying barriers and strengthening coordination mechanisms for the prevention, detection, and response to violence against women and family members, in alignment with the participatory and intercultural approach of the project.

- In the Judicial District of Junín, 55 participants (38 women and 17 men) took part in four workshops held in Ahuac, Chongos Bajo, Chupaca, and San José de Quero between June 17 and 20. The sessions emphasized recognizing local coordination challenges and defining shared procedures between peace judges and community authorities for effective victim support.
- In the Judicial District of Cajamarca, 89 participants (31 men and 58 women) attended four workshops held in Cochabamba, Chalamarca, Chota, and Huambos between May 27 and 30. These sessions provided a space for dialogue on the complementary roles of peace justice and community justice systems in addressing gender-based violence and building trust between institutional and community actors.
- In the Judicial District of Lima Este, 81 participants (17 men and 64 women) joined five workshops in Chilca, Huarochirí, Matucana, San Damián, and Sangallaya between June 23 and July 1. The focus was on establishing minimum standards for coordinated intervention in gender-based violence cases, identifying local protection services, and strengthening joint action protocols.
- In Huancavelica, 107 participants (78 men and 29 women) joined two workshops in Yauli and Accoria between August 12th and 14th, emphasizing the definition of minimum coordination

guidelines between peace judges, rondero organizations, and local institutions to improve community-level responses to gender-based violence.

These activities collectively contribute to reinforcing local governance mechanisms for GBV response, fostering dialogue between formal and community justice systems, and strengthening the role of peace judges as articulators of coordinated protection and referral routes for victims.

As part of the follow-up to these processes, the project organized the **“Meeting between Peace Justice and Communal and Rondero Justice: Building Justice Against Violence from Our Communities”**, which brought together a total of 90 participants from the four judicial districts — including peace judges, communal and rondero authorities, women leaders, ODAJUP coordinators and specialists. This event marked the culmination of a two-year participatory process that resulted in the joint development of 21 coordination instruments—including plans, referral pathways, and operational guidelines—aimed at improving the prevention, attention, and management of gender-based violence at district and community levels¹³. The encounter served as a space to exchange knowledge and good practices; as well as validate these instruments and reinforced collaboration between justice systems operating in rural contexts. For further information see Annex 2 - Success Story.

In November, the project organized the **international seminar “Justice in Debate: Interculturality in the Face of Gender-Based Violence”**, which brought together a total of 86 participants – including national and international experts, and State representatives to discuss the urgency of strengthening intercultural justice approaches and featured prominent specialists, including Elvira Álvarez Olazábal, Laura Saavedra Hernández, Tarcila Rivera Zea, and others. The event was held in collaboration with the Institute for Democracy and Human Rights – IDEHPUCP and the Master on Human Rights of PUCP university. Activity 1.2.4 – Conduct integrated socialization meetings with peace judges, local networks, community and district authorities, and local institutions to improve the response to gender-based violence.

32 integrated socialization meetings were held across the four judicial districts of Lima Este, Cajamarca, Huancavelica, and Junín, bringing together a total of 122 representatives from national, regional, and local institutions linked to gender-based violence prevention and response.

These meetings aimed to share the main results achieved in 2024 and present the 2025 Work Plan, reinforcing coordination mechanisms and identifying joint priorities for improving interinstitutional responses to gender-based violence within the scope of peace justice.

- In the Judicial District of **Lima Este**, **8 meetings** were organized with the participation of 42 representatives from MINEDU, MIMP, MINSA, PNP, the Superior Court of Justice, and district municipalities. The sessions focused on validating the 2025 plan and identifying areas for joint action, particularly in rural localities of Huarochirí province.
- In **Cajamarca**, **7 meetings** gathered 39 participants from MIMP, COPROSEC, MINSA, PNP, the Superior Court, CODISEC, and the Public Prosecutor’s Office, promoting synergies between justice and security actors at the local level.

- In **Huancavelica, 9 meetings** with 28 participants included representatives from the MIMP, Superior Court, MINSA, the Regional Government, and PNP, focusing on the follow-up of the provincial and regional “Routes for Responding to Violence Against Women and Family Members.”
- In **Junín, 8 meetings** were conducted with 13 representatives from the Municipal Government, the Regional Government, and the Superior Court, reviewing the lessons learned and defining local commitments for the implementation of the 2025 activities.

These meetings are crucial for strengthening interinstitutional coordination and information exchange among justice, health, education, and security institutions.

Output 2.1 Improved gender-based violence referral pathway by articulating the peace justice and ordinary justice

During the reporting period, project activities under this output focused on **advancing and securing approval of key technical instruments** developed as part of the implementation of the national action plan. 5 GBV referral pathways were developed, validated and approved with subnational authorities: East Lima (district of San Mateo de Huanchor), Huancavelica (Region and province of Huancavelica) and Cajamarca (district of Huambos and province of Chota).

Regarding **capacity development for ordinary justice operators**, the project completed the design of the specialized course for ordinary judges and prosecutors: “Violence against Women and Members of the Family Group: An Approach from Gender and Intercultural Perspectives”.

Activity 2.1.1 Conduct an analysis on the difficulties and bottle necks on the gender-based violence referral pathway and other systematic problems

Achieved and reported in 2023.

Activity 2.1.2. Design and implement an Action Plan to address the findings of the situation analysis reports.

Below is the progress on the activities from the action plans:

- **National level:**
 1. After its approval by the Executive Council of the Judiciary in March, the **pedagogical adaptation of the risk assessment form** for women victims of intimate partner violence, was printed and distributed to all peace judges in the four judicial districts, as well as to the ONAJUP for further nationwide distribution. It is currently hosted on the website of the Judiciary¹⁴. For more detail see activity 2.2.4.
 2. 01 information booklet "**Guidelines for coordination between the peace justice, the police and the health sector in rural areas in cases of violence against women and members of their families**" was validated through a participatory process and approved in June by

police in the four judicial districts; and is currently hosted on the website of the Judiciary¹⁵. For more detail see activity 2.2.4.

3. The **design of the specialized training program for ordinary justice operators**, “Violence against Women and Members of the Family Group: An Approach from Gender and Intercultural Perspectives” was completed during the reporting period. The course is aimed at strengthening the application of gender and intercultural approaches in the attention of gender-based violence cases in rural contexts. While initially planned to be implemented by the Judicial Academy (AMAG) in 2025, administrative and academic demands from AMAG proved to be challenging and poorly efficient. The project has advanced coordination with the official training centers of the Judiciary and the Public Prosecutor’s Office, to ensure the program’s academic certification, institutional appropriation, and implementation between June and July 2026 aimed at reaching 80 judges and prosecutors from the four judicial districts where the project operates.

- **Decentralized level:**

1. 05 local GBV referral pathways were finalized and approved in the framework of subnational security councils and municipal women’s concertation platforms: 1 in East Lima (district), 2 in Cajamarca (provincial and district) and 2 in Huancavelica (regional and provincial).

These instruments improve interinstitutional articulation between peace justice, local authorities, and the ordinary justice system for coordinated attention to women victims of gender-based violence; providing clear protocols for the referral, protection, and accompaniment of rural women victims of GBV.

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2. Additionally, in partnership with the Junin Superior Court of Justice, the project organized the **“III Competition for Protection Measures on Violence against Women and Family Members”**. The contest acknowledged four winning proposals from a total of 26 applications received, for their effective interinstitutional coordination and the systematic use of the Risk Assessment Form (FVR) for the attention of gender-based violence cases. The initiative contributed to identifying and disseminating innovative and replicable good practices in the issuance of protection measures by peace judges in rural contexts.

Activity 2.1.3 Organize meetings aimed to share comparative experiences and good practices on gender- based violence interventions and responses.

As the first experience sharing workshop was organized in 2022, one year in advance of the initial workplan;, the Third Exchange of Good Practices in Peace justice will take place in 2026.

Output 2.2 Enhanced capacity of ONAJUP and ODAJUP on gender awareness, management and educational skills

Project activities under this output primarily focused on the operational and logistical coordination required for the printing and distribution of the technical documents developed by the project. In parallel, initial discussions were held with ONAJUP to identify and define specific lines of technical assistance to strengthen its management capacities and coordination with peace judges. While limited progress was achieved during the reporting period, these discussions have been resumed and reinforced, with a clear emphasis placed on consolidating technical assistance priorities with ONAJUP as part of the project’s 2026 work plan.

Activity 2.2.1 Conduct an analysis on the jobs of ONAJUP and ODAJUP to strengthen their systems

Achieved and reported in 2021.

Activity 2.2.2 Design capacity building programs and develop training materials for ONAJUP and ODAJUP

Achieved and reported in 2024.

Activity 2.2.3 Implement capacity building programs (gender awareness, administrative and educational skills) for ONAJUP and ODAJUP staff

The three capacity-building courses were successfully completed and reported in 2023 and 2024.

The draft bill to amend Law No. 29824, the “Peace Justice Law,” prepared in 2024 is currently under internal review and is expected to be submitted to Congress by the Executive Council of the Judiciary²⁴.

In parallel, initial efforts were made to identify additional technical assistance needs aimed at strengthening ONAJUP’s coordination with ODAJUP offices and peace judges. While this process is still underway, the project team convened a meeting with the Judiciary – including ONAJUP- in December 2025 to define and prioritize the activities to be implemented during the first semester of 2026 focusing on: (i) consolidating the peace judges’ training process, (ii) ensuring the methodological transfer of the training program to support its sustainability, and (iii) strengthening the institutionalization of the Unified Peace Justice System (SISJUPAZ).

Activity 2.2.4 Collect and produce booklets of precedents for peace judges.

Printing and distribution of key resources advanced as follows:

- 635 copies of the Friendly Version of the Protocol of Action of the Peace Courts for the application of Law No. 30364 were delivered to East Lima (35), Junín (300), Huancavelica (100), Cajamarca (200).
- 1840 copies of the Risk Assessment Form for women victims of intimate partner violence, pedagogically adapted for use by peace judges, were distributed to ONAJUP (500) and peace judges across the four judicial districts: East Lima (95), Junín (455), Huancavelica (270), Cajamarca (520).
- 3000 copies of the informative booklet “Guidelines for coordination between peace justice, police, and health services in rural areas” were printed and 2430 of them were distributed as follows: Cajamarca (700), Junin (700), Huancavelica (400), East Lima (130) and ONAJUP (500).

Output 2.3 Developed Information Application System for management of Peace Justice

In August, the Unified System of Peace Justice (SISJUPAZ) was institutionalized through Administrative Resolution N° 000285-2025-CE-PJ²⁵ thereby reaffirming its role as a transformative digital platform for rural justice. The pilot phase in Cajamarca, Junín, Huancavelica, and Lima Este concludes on December 31st. The Judiciary is considering the extension of this phase until April 2026 to ensure the proper use of the system.

More than 483 peace judges²⁵ and technical staff (ONAJUP, ODAJUP, and IT units) have been trained in its use. The project will continue focusing on ensuring the sustained use of SISJUPAZ through continuous technical support.

Activity 2.3.1 - Develop, implement and operationalize a computerized management system for the peace justice

On August 21st, the Judiciary and UNDP officially launched the Unified System of Peace Justice (SISJUPAZ) as a pioneering digital platform designed to strengthen access to justice in rural and intercultural contexts. The event brought together high-level representatives from the Judiciary, UNDP, KOICA, and other national institutions. The launch marked a key milestone in promoting innovation and digital transformation within the justice sector, while reinforcing the role of community justice as a pillar of inclusive and accessible justice in Peru. For further information see Annex 2 - Success Story.

Activity 2.3.2 – Provide equipment for the implementation of the peace justice computerized management system

Achieved and reported in 2024.

Activity 2.3.3 – Train end users, both peace judges and system administrators, using a training of trainers (ToT) strategy to increase their knowledge and skills in using the system

A Training of Trainers program was launched and was implemented for ONAJUP, ODAJUP, and IT staff, to ensure sustainability and nationwide scalability. The program has been designed to build localized technical expertise within the Judiciary, enabling continuous in-house training for new peace judges and guaranteeing the long-term operationalization of the system.

Additionally, up to 26 training sessions for peace judges on the use of SISJUPAZ were delivered by ONAJUP and UNDP in the four judicial districts until December 2025.

2.3.2. Challenges and Mitigation Measures

Activity 1.1.3. Implement gender awareness training for peace judges

To guarantee the peace judges' participation in the training program, it has been crucial to draw on the successful experiences in Junin and Huancavelica, where formal institutional communications, individualized follow-up, and the establishment of permanent local liaison teams were implemented. Flexibility should also be maintained, allowing peace judges who cannot attend their assigned group to participate in alternative sessions, ensuring the continuity of the training process without compromising the methodology. These efforts should be complemented by continuing follow-up to identify absences or low participation, helping to prevent disengagement through timely pedagogical and motivational strategies.

Equally important are the meetings that ODAJUP, Sumaq Justicia, and DESCOCENTRO have conducted in each judicial district following the completion of all module workshops. Discussions have included anticipating potential logistical or cultural challenges, ensuring coordinated schedules, and clearly defining roles. The quality of the training experience also depends on effective post-workshop support, which reinforces motivation and understanding through follow-up calls, WhatsApp groups, and digital forms. Finally, improving the logistical conditions of training sessions, ensuring the technical reliability of local teams and maintaining systematic induction processes in the event of rotations of peace judges

or key staff are priorities to consolidate the sustainability and effectiveness of the process over time.

In this context, the institutionalization of the training programs remains a key challenge. To address this, the project will reinforce methodological transfer processes in close coordination with ONAJUP, strengthening the training-of-trainers approach to mitigate the risk of capacity loss due to staff turnover and to ensure continuity beyond the project lifecycle.

Activity 1.2.2 Strengthen networks of women to promote their engagement in responding to gender-based violence at the local level, within the framework of collaborative and participatory dialogue with the peace justice system.

In previous editions, the innovation challenge “Women Who Transform” was left unawarded in East Lima due to limited participation. For the third edition, this challenge was addressed through a differentiated call specifically designed for East Lima, combined with itinerant dialogues and targeted outreach, which enabled organizations from the judicial district to successfully submit proposals and engage more actively in the initiative.

Activity 2.1.2 Design and implement an action plan for each judicial district and at the national level, based on the findings of the situational report.

- Challenges were encountered in gathering information for the development of referral pathways for cases of violence against women and family members, as institutions more time than expected to provide data. Additionally, the information received was fragmented and lacked clarity regarding institutional competencies. Requests for information were channeled through the technical secretariats of the relevant bodies or committees. Individual requests were also made, and the consultant had to supplement these efforts with a comprehensive online search.
- Regarding the specialized training program for justice operators on “Violence Against Women and Family Members in Rural Areas”, the restrictive requirements of the Judicial Academy (AMAG) for course delivery and certification limited the ability to offer the program efficiently and expand its reach without compromising academic validity and institutional sustainability.

In response, the project has explored implementation in partnership with other official judicial training institutions that can provide equivalent certification. This approach aims to ensure academic rigor, institutional sustainability, and broader coverage, while maintaining the quality of the training and the effective integration of gender and intercultural approaches in the attention of rural gender-based violence cases.

Activity 2.3.3 – Train end users, both peace judges and system administrators, using a training of trainers (ToT) strategy to increase their knowledge and skills in using the system

The implementation of the SISJUPAZ training program faced several logistical and technical challenges during the reporting period. The large size of participant groups created difficulties in ensuring effective interaction and follow-up during online sessions. Additionally, connectivity issues and access constraints—particularly related to the Judiciary’s internal platforms (ASESOFTWARE and PJ systems)—affected the smooth participation of some districts, notably in Cajamarca. These limitations required additional coordination time prior to each session to verify access and connectivity with the Judiciary’s IT teams.

Another ongoing challenge relates to the institutionalization and sustained use of SISJUPAZ. Beyond initial training, the system requires continued technical and institutional accompaniment led by the Judiciary's Information Technology Office and ONAJUP to support change management, address connectivity and access barriers, and ensure the consolidation of trained technical teams in each judicial district. The rotation of peace judges and technical staff further reinforces the need for systematic training-of-trainers and induction processes.

To address these challenges, the project:

- Divided participants into smaller groups to enhance interaction and ensure individualized technical support during virtual sessions.
- Introduced pre-session technical checks, conducted 30 minutes before each training, to verify system access and troubleshoot connectivity issues in coordination with Judiciary IT staff.
- Strengthened institutional follow-up with ONAJUP to promote formal communications and resolutions ensuring that all judicial districts designate and maintain a core team of trainers responsible for replication and continuity.
- Established close monitoring with the Judiciary's IT teams to oversee system performance, ensure reliability, and document technical guarantee processes for future scaling.

Additional general risks include logistical and connectivity limitations that may affect the effective use of SISJUPAZ, as well as budgetary constraints within ONAJUP that could put at risk the replication of the training program on violence against women for peace judges and the sustained accompaniment required for SISJUPAZ use. In these cases, coordination with the Judiciary and KOICA will be pursued to assess mitigation measures within their respective mandates.

Finally, fluctuations in the exchange rate pose a financial risk by progressively reducing available resources in local currency. To mitigate this risk, the project will maintain permanent monitoring of financial impacts and adjust operational and budgetary planning when necessary.

2.4 Achievements in Cross-Cutting Issues

Gender mainstreaming

Sumaq Justicia remains a Gender Marker 3 project for UNDP, with gender equality and the empowerment of women as an explicit objective and a central driver of project design and implementation. In 2025, the gender approach continued to be systematically mainstreamed across all outputs, with particular emphasis on prevention, response, and institutional change in rural and intercultural justice settings.

Key achievements include:

- The implementation of the specialized training course “Strengthening the capacities of peace judges to address cases of violence against women and family members”, which reached more than 450 peace judges. The course applied a gender-sensitive and rights-based approach, strengthening judges' capacities to identify risk, adopt protection measures, and coordinate referrals, with particular attention to women survivors in rural contexts.
- The promotion and recognition of women peace judges' leadership through national and subnational events, institutional ceremonies, and administrative resolutions, which acknowledged their trajectories and contributions to access to justice and the prevention of gender-based violence.

- The strengthening of women’s leadership and collective action through the third edition of the Women Who Transform innovation challenge, supporting women’s organizations to implement community-based initiatives that combine prevention, accompaniment, and articulation with peace justice.
- The integration of an andragogical and gender-responsive approach across training, dialogue spaces, and community activities, addressing generational, literacy, and digital gaps that disproportionately affect women, particularly in rural and indigenous territories.

Interculturality

The intercultural approach continued to guide project implementation in 2025, ensuring that justice responses to gender-based violence are culturally relevant, accessible, and grounded in local realities where peace justice plays a key role.

Key achievements include:

- The joint development, validation, and approval of 21 coordination instruments (plans, referral pathways, and guidelines) at district, provincial, and regional levels, through participatory processes that brought together peace judges, community authorities, women leaders, and state actors. These instruments reflect local norms, languages, and institutional configurations, strengthening culturally appropriate responses to violence.
- The consolidation of intercultural pedagogical adaptations of key technical tools, including the Risk Assessment Form and the coordination guidelines between peace justice, police, and health services, ensuring their usability in rural and intercultural contexts.
- The use of culturally grounded methodologies in community and youth-focused initiatives—such as theatre, fairs, storytelling, and digital content creation (including TikTok campaigns)—to engage girls, adolescents, and communities in prevention and empowerment processes.
- The facilitation of inclusive participation in events and training activities through language support (including Quechua), context-sensitive scheduling, and logistical adaptations that respond to territorial realities, caregiving responsibilities, and mobility constraints.
- The positioning of peace justice as a culturally legitimate and trusted first point of access to justice, reinforced through community-based dialogues and exchanges with communal and rondera justice actors, highlighting complementarities between justice systems.

2.5 Communication and Partnership with KOICA

Visibility of the Sumaq Justicia project has been strong across media and institutional platforms. A total of 137 publications were generated, including 59 web articles, 70.8% of which were from the PNUD Perú account, underscoring its leading role in the communication strategy. The following detail covers the main publications from January to December 2025 in chronological order.

1. Second edition of the “Women who Transform” innovation award

The second edition of the “Women Who Transform” innovation award was strategically amplified across UNDP Peru’s digital platforms. Communication efforts highlighted the stories of the winners through multi-platform dissemination and included a featured interview, which helped deepen public recognition of their voices and contributions. This outreach not only increased the visibility of the initiative but also showcased women-led solutions for community transformation.

9. Presentation of SISJUPAZ: Advancing Access to Justice in Rural Areas

In early 2025, over 1,800 cases of gender-based violence were reported in rural Peru, where Peace Justice often represents the only access to justice. To address challenges such as manual case registration and lack of

integrated systems, a new digital platform, SISJUPAZ, was introduced to improve case management and coordination. Its implementation began in four judicial districts and will become mandatory in 2026, aiming to strengthen protection measures and ensure timely responses for victims.

10. Meeting Between Peace Justice and Communal and Rondera Justice

In rural areas, women face persistent barriers to accessing justice, including geographic isolation, lack of information, and cultural norms that reinforce gender inequality. Against this backdrop, the meeting between Peace Justice and communal justice systems created a vital space for dialogue and coordination. By sharing experiences and building joint strategies, the event underscored the importance of inclusive, community-based approaches to ensure timely and effective protection for victims of gender-based violence.

Furthermore, the key messages and insights from the event were leveraged in a digital campaign for the 25N, reinforcing the importance of joint efforts to combat violence against women. This campaign was enriched by the testimonies of community leaders, as well as the expertise of specialists and territorial managers, providing a deeper understanding of the challenges faced by women victims in rural areas and how collaborative work can lead to concrete actions to address gender-based violence.

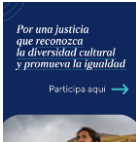

2.6 Risk Management

- Change in political authorities at national, sub-national and judicial levels:**

Probability: Expected

Impact: High

Risk level: Moderate

Status and management risk:

- UNDP will continue to maintain a close and institutional relationship with the Judiciary, prioritizing technical teams (ONAJUP, ODAJUP, Gender Justice Commission and IT units) to ensure continuity beyond changes in authorities.
- The project will proactively brief new authorities on project objectives, progress, and results, emphasizing SISJUPAZ institutionalization and the gender-based violence response framework, to secure renewed political and institutional commitment.

- **The ordinary justice system is not interested in working in coordination with the peace justice system to address gender-based violence.**

Probability: Moderate

Impact: Moderate

Risk level: Moderate

Risk status and management:

- The project will continue facilitating structured dialogue spaces, joint trainings, and coordination mechanisms between peace judges, ordinary justice operators, police, and health services, in coordination with ONAJUP and the Gender Justice Commission.
- Validated referral pathways, coordination guidelines, and joint events will be used as institutional entry points to strengthen collaboration and reduce resistance or fragmentation between justice systems.
- In addition, the project will implement a specialized training course for judges and prosecutors on “Violence Against Women and Family Members: Gender and Intercultural Approaches”, which will explicitly address the role of peace justice and articulation processes in the response to gender-based violence, contributing to improved mutual understanding, institutional recognition, and coordinated case management between peace justice and ordinary justice systems.

- **Special authorities (community and peasant patrol authorities), representatives of civil society and women leaders, especially rural women, as well as local government authorities that are part of the gender-based violence attention route are not interested in strengthening their articulation with the peace justice system.**

Probability: Low

Impact: High

Risk Level: Moderate

Risk status and management:

- The project conducted a situational analysis to better understand the roles, capacities, and interaction of community authorities and local actors with peace justice in the project territories.
- To mitigate this risk, the project will promote the pedagogical and intercultural adaptation of technical instruments, including the referral pathways developed during the last two years, to ensure their accessibility, cultural relevance, and alignment with local practices and languages.
- The adapted instruments will be disseminated considering different means such as decentralized workshops, community dialogues, and inter-institutional coordination spaces, with the aim of strengthening ownership by community authorities, women leaders, peasant patrol actors, and local governments, and reinforcing their sustained participation in coordinated responses to gender-based violence alongside peace justice.

- **Rotation of peace judges and key institutional staff, potentially weakening installed capacities**

Probability: Expected

Impact: High

Risk level: Moderate

Risk status and management:

- The project will reinforce the institutionalization of training programs, prioritizing the consolidation of Training of Trainers (ToT) strategies and methodological transfer processes in coordination with ONAJUP.
- Systematic induction mechanisms and updated training materials will be promoted to ensure continuity of capacities despite staff turnover.
- Coordination with the Judiciary will be strengthened to formally recognize and sustain trained focal points within each judicial district.

- **Limited institutional appropriation of SISJUPAZ, particularly at the technical level**

Impact: High

Risk level: Substantial

Risk status and management:

- The project will coordinate with the Judiciary and KOICA to better align mitigation strategies related to the institutional ownership and sustained use of SISJUPAZ.
- Technical accompaniment will be reinforced beyond initial training, focusing on change management, clarification of institutional roles, and consolidation of responsibilities led by the Judiciary's IT units and ONAJUP.
- Capacities of technical teams will be strengthened to ensure sustained use and future scaling of SISJUPAZ.

- **Logistical and connectivity limitations affecting the effective use of SISJUPAZ**

Impact: Moderate

Risk level: Moderate

Risk status and management:

- The project will continue coordinating with the Judiciary and KOICA to identify and implement mitigation measures related to connectivity and access constraints, particularly in rural districts.
- Operational planning will incorporate flexible modalities, technical pre-checks, and differentiated support to ensure continuity of system use despite logistical limitations.

- **Budgetary constraints of ONAJUP affecting the implementation and replication of training programs and sustained accompaniment for SISJUPAZ**

Probability: Expected

Impact: High

Risk level: Substantial

Risk status and management:

- Emphasis will be placed on institutionalizing training processes and SISJUPAZ related functions within existing operational structures to reduce dependency on external resources over time.
- The project will maintain close coordination with the Judiciary and KOICA to assess potential budgetary constraints and jointly identify mitigation measures.

- **Exchange rate fluctuations reducing available funds in local currency**

Probability: Expected

Impact: High

Risk level: Substantial

Risk status and management:

- The project will carry out continuous monitoring of exchange rate variations and their financial impact.
- Operational and budget planning will be adjusted as necessary to safeguard priority activities and ensure efficient use of resources.
- Since 2023, a taxes recovery strategy has been implemented by the project to minimize part of the impact generated by the exchange rate variation.

2. Success stories

Highlighting and Revaluing the Role of Women in Peace Justice



For Sumaq Justicia, it is a top priority to increase visibility and recognition of peace justice, as its vital role in providing access to justice, particularly in rural areas, is often underappreciated.

As part of the commemoration of International Women's Day, and with the goal of bringing the history of peace justice and the critical role women play in it to the public spotlight, the photographic and testimonial exhibition *Women in Peace Justice* was organized. The exhibition was held at *Pasaje Los Pintores* in Parque Kennedy, a central and high-traffic area in the Miraflores district of Lima, for ten days.

The exhibit featured photographs that traced the 200-year history of peace justice in Peru, highlighting the significant growth of peace judges, which has now surpassed 6,000.

It was explained that peace justice is the first point of contact for legal matters in rural areas, ensuring access to justice for low-income communities. The exhibition also emphasized the use of processes that honor the worldview and customs of each community.

Additionally, the exhibit showcased the pivotal role peace justice plays in addressing, preventing, and penalizing cases of violence against women, being the first legal recourse available to victims.



The exhibition also shared the personal stories of four peace judges from different regions of Peru: Bertha de la Cruz, Lidia Lapierre, Heidrum Flores, and Socorro Arteaga, who serve in Huancavelica, Junín, Huarochirí, and Cajamarca, respectively.

Their stories, woven throughout the exhibit, exemplified the courage and dedication with which hundreds of female judges carry out their work, balancing the demands of their communities' traditions and the Constitution, ensuring their decisions are both legally valid and culturally legitimate.

Outcome:

The strategic location of the exhibition made it possible to share the history and significance of peace justice with Lima's residents and tourists. It also allowed the inspiring stories of four peace judges from different regions to be heard, positioning peace justice as an important issue in a prominent city location.

Perspectives:

Creating spaces in Lima and other regions that highlight the work of peace judges increases public awareness and appreciation of their role. This contributes to reducing gaps in understanding and ensuring that peace justice is more widely recognized as a fundamental part of the judicial system.

Launch of SISJUPAZ: Advancing access to justice in rural areas



The Unified System of Peace Justice (SISJUPAZ) was presented as an innovative milestone in strengthening access to justice in rural areas of Peru, where peace justice is often the first and only legal mechanism available to victims of violence.

The new digital platform allows peace judges to efficiently register and monitor cases, improving coordination with the ordinary judiciary and ensuring faster responses in situations of gender-based violence. By replacing manual registration with a secure digital system, SISJUPAZ reduces the risk of document loss and facilitates better data management between institutions.



The official launch event brought together authorities from the judiciary and the executive branch, representatives from the judicial districts where the tool is being implemented, and national and international specialists in digital governance. The event served as an opportunity to demonstrate the platform's functionalities and highlight its role in modernizing the administration of justice.

Participants also reflected on the challenges of digital innovation in rural areas with limited internet connectivity. The discussions emphasized the importance of digital inclusion and institutional capacity to ensure sustainability of this technological innovation.

Outcome:

The launch of SISJUPAZ is an important step toward a more inclusive, transparent, and efficient judicial system, bringing digital transformation closer to peace justice and helping to strengthen public confidence in public institutions. By digitizing case management, the tool improves coordination among judicial actors at different levels, helping to ensure that victims of violence receive faster and more effective protection.



Perspective:

The expansion of SISJUPAZ to other regions will consolidate the digital transformation of the peace justice improving working conditions for nearly 6,000 peace judges throughout the country, hence impacting of justice delivery. The initiative demonstrates how technology can reduce institutional barriers and contribute to a judicial system that is more responsive to the needs of the population in rural areas.

Meeting Between Peace Justice and Communal and Rondera Justice: Strengthening local justice systems



The Meeting Between Peace Justice and Communal and Rondera Justice marked an important milestone in advancing coordinated responses to gender-based violence in rural areas of Peru. The event brought together peace judges, communal authorities, and rondera organizations from Chota (Cajamarca), Chupaca (Junín), Huancavelica, and Huarochirí (Lima Este), consolidating efforts to improve access to justice for vulnerable populations.

This meeting showcased the results of a two-year process during which local actors developed action plans, communal routes, and coordination guidelines to strengthen collaboration between peace justice and community-based systems. These efforts aim to address structural challenges that hinder timely and effective assistance for victims of violence in rural territories.



The event convened high-level representatives from the judiciary, the Ministry of Culture, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), and the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA), as well as specialists in gender, interculturality, and community justice. It served as a platform to present the progress achieved through joint work and to highlight the role of territorial and intercultural approaches in improving justice delivery.

Participants engaged in discussions on proposals for coordination, analyzed challenges such as the absence of a legal framework for inter-institutional collaboration, and explored strategies for implementing community-based mechanisms. The program included panels, group work sessions, and presentations of successful experiences from different regions, fostering an exchange of knowledge and practical solutions to strengthen justice systems in rural areas.

Outcome:

The meeting reinforced collaboration among peace judges, communal authorities, and rondera organizations, consolidating a network committed to addressing gender-based violence through coordinated action. It also highlighted the territorial approach promoted by the Sumaq Justicia Project, which considers territories as dynamic spaces shaped by social, cultural, and institutional relationships rather than solely administrative boundaries.



Perspective:

Building on this milestone, future actions will focus on consolidating these coordination mechanisms and promoting inclusive justice systems that respond to the realities of rural communities. The initiative demonstrates how integrated efforts between institutions and local actors can contribute to reducing violence and fostering trust in justice systems.

Justice in Debate: Advancing Intercultural Approaches to Gender-Based Violence



The International Seminar “Justice in Debate: Interculturality in Addressing Gender-Based Violence” took place on November 5 and 6 at the Pontifical Catholic University of Peru (PUCP). The event convened national and international experts, judicial authorities, and Indigenous leaders to examine how gender and intercultural approaches can transform justice systems and strengthen the protection of women’s rights.

Gender-based violence remains one of the most pressing human rights challenges in Latin America, disproportionately affecting Indigenous and rural women. These women face intersecting forms of discrimination, structural, cultural, and territorial, that limit their access to justice. The seminar addressed these issues from a multidisciplinary perspective, fostering dialogue between academia, public institutions, and grassroots organizations.

The program included three panels:

- Emerging forms of gender-based violence affecting Indigenous and rural women.
- Demands and strategies for access to justice, showcasing experiences of women driving change.
- Mainstreaming gender and interculturality in justice administration, analyzing inclusive policies and practices.

Discussions highlighted that violence against Indigenous women is a violation of human rights and called for reforms and training to ensure justice systems reflect cultural diversity and gender equality.

Outcome:

The seminar positioned intercultural justice as a cornerstone for addressing gender-based violence and reducing structural inequalities. Hosting the event at PUCP, one of Peru’s most influential universities, was strategic in reaching a broad academic audience, including students from PUCP and other institutions. This engagement amplified awareness among young people and fostered critical debate on gender and interculturality, ensuring these issues become part of the agenda for future professionals and decision-makers.

Perspective:

Moving forward, the challenge is to translate these discussions into concrete actions: legal reforms, institutional capacity-building, and inclusive practices that empower Indigenous women as agents of change. Advancing toward an intercultural approach requires not only policy adjustments but also a cultural shift within justice systems, making diversity and gender equality central pillars of human rights protection.
