I. PROJECT OVERVIEW

The Project aims at contributing to the sustainable, tangible and people-centred post-conflict recovery of the most vulnerable communities and groups offering durable solutions at the humanitarian-development nexus. The Project pursues the following objectives:

Objective 1. Build sustainable emergency livelihoods for the displaced population in the regions of Armenia;

Objective 2. Support socioeconomic integration of the displaced population, war veterans and other vulnerable groups through various job creation mechanisms across country (including Yerevan);

Objective 3. Maximize the benefits of socioeconomic recovery for the host communities and the displaced population through sustainable energy solutions.

Duration: 30 July 2021 – 31 December 2023.

Implementing partner: Ministry of Territorial Administration and infrastructure.

Theory of change: If the Project supports the target beneficiaries to meet their basic needs, such as housing and minimum income standards through building sustainable households, and the assumption that restored livelihoods will strengthen the sense of belonging and security and facilitate social integration in post-conflict settings, holds true.

AND if the target beneficiary groups gain access to sustainable job opportunities, and the assumption, that restored income levels and economic inclusion will prevent the target vulnerable groups to fall below the poverty line and will help to curb out migration and social tensions in post-crisis stages, hold true.

AND if the access to renewable energy sources and green energy solutions are facilitated on household and community level, and the assumption that green technologies will help to bring down the utility costs and result in considerable savings, which can be meaningfully redistributed by the communities for public goods and increase the purchasing capacity of households, holds true.

THEN the Project will contribute to the sustainable, tangible and people-centred post-conflict recovery of the most vulnerable communities and groups offering durable solutions at the humanitarian-development nexus.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2023

GREENHOUSES



The Project launched an initiative of Greenhouses to support the self-employment of displaced persons, war veterans and other vulnerable groups in the settlements of Goris community in Syunik region. 10 tunnel type greenhouses, (150 m², rain watering) were purchased, 7 of which were provided to the displaced and local beneficiaries of Barcravan, Goris and Verishen settlements. The initiative also included the course "Establishment, operation of greenhouses" which consists of

theoretical and practical parts. A two-day theoretical course was held in Goris. The practical training was conducted in Darakert, in the greenhouse of the Scientific Center of Vegetables and Technical Crops. The participants were the families of 10 displaced and local beneficiaries in target

settlements. All participants were satisfied with the courses, they returned with a lot of knowledge and practical experience, ready to start their greenhouse businesses.

Immediately after the completion of greenhouses installation the beneficiaries were provided with seeds of various greens: coriander, lettuce, and spinach. In February of the next year, tomato and cucumber seedlings will also be provided. The beneficiaries are very hopeful that they will have a plentiful and nutritious harvest.



PLAYGROUNDS AND STREET WORKOUTS



the Street Workout Federation of Armenia demonstrated performances at the new sports ground to motivate the population to regularly exercise and do sport. A total of 7000 children and young people will use the Street Workout space. With the installations of these two playgrounds and street workout, the Project concluded the initiative of installing playgrounds and sportsgrounds, as a result of which, in 2022-2023, 15 playgrounds and

In 2023, two children's playgrounds were installed in Chambarak community of Gegharkunik marz. It will provide safe and multifunctional entertainment for children living in Chambarak and neighboring settlements. In total about 3400 people will benefit from the playgrounds.

In 2023, in the 5th district Avanagard (Tsti Bner) of Goris community, a sports ground was installed. It is planned for both children and young people, benefiting 7000 people. The students of



3 sport workout complexes were installed in Syunik, Gegharkunik and Vayots Dzor marzes.

COTTAGES

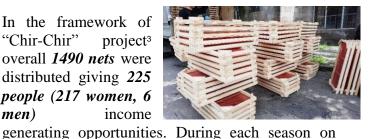
Within the project, 2 modular cottages (3 modules for 9 people and 2 modules for 6 people) are purchased and installed in Barcravan, Goris, Syunik regions. Cottages are under the municipality ownership and are allocated to displaced families for use. The project in the framework of close cooperation with Goris municipality allocated the space to 2 displaced families from Nagorno Karabakh. First family was displaced in 2020, a family of 6 people, the second family of 8 people was displaced in September 2023. By settling in cottages in Barcravan, the families also received 150sqm greenhouses for their use to also have their income generating opportunities.



"CHIR-CHIR" PROJECT



In the framework of "Chir-Chir" project3 overall 1490 nets were distributed giving 225 people (217 women, 6 men) income



average people can dry 20 kg fruits and vegetables from each net. From 1490 nets provided the total production input will equal to 29,800 per season. 6 trainings were organized with the participation of 230 people. During the trainings the participants were able to gain indepth knowledge about the whole chain of dried fruit production starting from production techniques to its marketing and sale.

HONEY-MONEY PROJECT



In the framework of the "Honey-Money" project4, 402 beehives have been distributed to 150 people in 16 settlements⁵ of Syunik region. From each beehive it is possible to annually produce 12kg honey. Thus, beehives distributed have a potential to



produce 4824 kg honey, becoming a good income generating opportunity for the beneficiaries. In addition, 154 beekeeping accessories were provided to these people to facilitate and improve beekeeping and honey production procedures. 1 training was

To support beekeepers and the industry, the project came up with pragmatic solutions by acquiring innovative polyurethane (PPU) beehives that could possibly boost production in the short run. PPU hives are spreading globally even though at a slow rate.

organized with the participation of *71 people* (*57 men*, *14 women*). The training aimed at raising the participants' expertise in honey production and beekeeping.

Component 1: Build sustainable livelihoods for the displaced population and communities in the bordering regions of Syunik, Gegharkunik and Vayots Dzor

2021

- 55,600 kg fodder was distributed to 54 households in Vayots Dzor region benefiting 220 people (110 males, 110 females).
- A horse stable of "ASP" riding club of *Martuni settlement in Gegharkunik region* was renovated to support the displaced population to host their horses benefiting (40 males, 40 females).

<u> 2022</u>

- 13 playgrounds were installed giving an opportunity to 5710 people (2834 men, 2876 women) to have modern and high-quality playgrounds. The playgrounds were equipped in the following settlements: Vorotan, Nerkin Khndzoresk, Artashesyan district, Shurnukh, Karahunj, Salqar district, Akner, Yeghvard, Syunik, Vardavank (Syunik region), Rind, Yelpin, Areni (Vayots Dzor).
- 2 workout spaces were equipped in Areni (Vayots Dzor) giving an opportunity to 940 people (463 men, 477 females) to train with modern and high-quality workout equipment.
- New irrigation pipelines were provided to Meghri (1.5 km) and Shikahogh (7 km) settlements in Syunik region benefiting 4476 people (2215 men, 2261 women).
- 850kg of seed were provided to 19 displaced families in Vayk, Yeghegnadzor, Yeghegis settlements of Vayots Dzor region, benefiting 595 people (298 males, 297 females). In addition, 4000kg seeds were provided to Kapan and Syunik settlements of Syunik region benefiting 1190 people (596 men, 594 women).
- A childcare center is being designed *in Bardzravan*, *Syunik region*.
- 10,660 kg of grass was distributed to conflict affected families benefiting 92 people (46 men, 46 women) in Shikahogh, Syunik.

2023

- 2 playgrounds were equipped in Chambarak settlement of Gegharkunik giving an opportunity to 3396 people (1655 men, 1741 women) to have modern and high-quality playgrounds.
- A workout space was equipped in Gorisi (Syunik) giving an opportunity to 7000 people (2500 men, 4500 females) to train with modern and high-quality workout equipment.
- 2 modular cottages were given to 2 families benefiting 14 people (8 men, 6 women).
- 7.5kilometer drinking water pipes were installed Verishen, Goris giving an opportunity of having permanent drinking water supply to 1765 people (843 men, 922 women).

Project: Cottages



Andranik Harutyunyan's family consists of 8 people: his mother, his 3rd degree disabled brother, his wife and 4 children. The family was forced to leave their land, leaving what they had earned and created over the years. After crossing the border bridge, the family was accommodated in the Goris hotel. Having received an offer from the community authorities to resettle, the family moved to the cottage with kitchen furniture in the Bartsavan settlement, Goris. The family also received a greenhouse to support its livelihood. The three module cottage, the kitchen furniture and the greenhouse are procured and installed by the project. Today, the entire family is busy with the cultivation of the greenhouse and the land allocated by the municipality. They are waiting for the first results.

Component 2: Support socioeconomic integration of the displaced population, war veterans and other vulnerable groups through various job creation mechanisms across country (including Yerevan)

2021

• A vehicle UAZ 374195 was presented to a local PE for delivery of bakery products to 6 semi-isolated settlements of Syunik region (Tchakaten, Shikahogh, Srashen, Nerkin Hand, Tsav, Shishkert) benefiting people 846 people (410 males, 436 females). In addition, 2 male drivers got the employment opportunity.

2022

- 100 units of beehives were given to 56 people in Vorotan, Shikahogh, Srashen, Nerqin Hand, Tsav, Shishkert settlements of Syunik region contributing to the promotion of beekeeping and economic activity in the settlement. As a result, 56 people got self-employment opportunities (40 males, 16 females).
- The Project supported a regional business of Davit Bek settlement in Kapan municipality with the potential to hire displaced, veterans and other vulnerable groups with provision of baking equipment set Electric oven WFC-306D; Dough making machine WFF-13A; Electric dough mixer (BAKER) YS-W110H-3D; Teflon-lined trays SIN-15-1.
- A Responsible Party Agreement has been signed with "Global Developments" Fund for supporting socioeconomic integration of the displaced population, war veterans and other vulnerable groups through on-the-job trainings. 100 beneficiaries from Yerevan and 4 regions (Ararat, Armavir, Aragatsotn and Kotayk) received on the job training. As a result, 36 people got jobs (17 males, 19 females).
- 8 beekeeping trainings were organized for the residents of the bordering settlements of Syunik regions aimed at providing the participants with necessary skills to become professional beekeepers and ensure income-generating opportunities for them (overall number of participants 367 (87 females, 280 males).
- 3 advanced sewing operators' trainings were conducted for displaced people and other vulnerable groups to advance the skill of sewing and tailoring specialists to get work in a sewing industry or start a new business (overall number of participants 31 females).

2023

- 402 units of beehives were distributed to 150 people (97 men, 53 women) giving them income generating opportunities. In addition, 154 units of beekeeping accessories were provided to improve and facilitate beekeeping procedures for these people.
- 1490 nets were provided to 225 people (8 men, 217 women) giving them an opportunity to dry fruits and vegetables in better sanitary hygienic conditions.
- 10 greenhouses were purchases out of which 7 greenhouses were provided to 7 conflict affected families giving them an opportunity to develop their own businesses and generate income. Overall, the provided 7 greenhouses benefited 35 people (number of beneficiaries multiplied by 5, the average number of their family members).
- 2 "I Can" project female beneficiaries got 2 overlock sewing machines to start their own businesses and generate incomes.
- 2 advanced sewing operators' trainings were organized for displaced people and other vulnerable groups to skill sewing and tailoring specialists to work in a sewing industry or start a new business (overall number of participants 18 women).
- 2 trainings were organized on culinary and confectionery to help the participants to enhance their skill in the sphere and become more demanded professionals (overall number of participants 38 (37 women, 1 man).
- 6 trainings were organized on dried fruits and vegetables production, which helped to master new technologies of producing more healthy and natural dried fruits (overall number of participants 230 (222 women, 8 men).
- A training was organized on beekeeping skills giving the opportunity to 71 participants (57 men, 14 women) to enrich their knowledge on beekeeping techniques and honey production skills.
- In the framework of "I Can" project 2 training sessions were organized for 5 young entrepreneurs (2 men, 3 women) to help them to develop their business ideas and turn them into business plans.
- 2 greenhouse trainings (theoretical and practical) were organized giving an opportunity to 10 people (6 women, 4 men) to specialize in modern techniques and skills of greenhouse operation.
- 3 training sessions on professional mushroom production was organized for 46 people (38 men, 8 women) interested in oyster mushroom production which will ensure their income generating opportunities.

Project: Greenhouses



Tsakhkanush Manutsyan's family consists of 5 people: a husband and 3 children. They are forced to resettle in Goris community. She was informed about the greenhouse project and was registered to participate. After the training courses, she was selected for the participation in the project. Now Tsakhanush is cultivating the greenhouse and the first harvest free of charge was delivered to the hotel in their neighborhood, where the displaced Artsakh residents took temporary shelter in September 2023.



Aida Grigoryan's family consisted of 6 people: her husband and 4 children. Currently she lives in Barcravan settlement in Goris and her family is the second family living in the modular cottage. The entire family is actively engaged in the greenhouse business and hope that business will be a stable source of income for the family. The two modular cottage, the kitchen furniture and the greenhouse are procured and installed by the project.

Project: I Can



Hripsime from Yeghvard was among the beneficiaries of "I can" project⁶ and received an encouragement prize - a sewing machine. She is a mother of 2 children and currently is working at home, tailoring, and sewing seasonal children's clothing for sale.



Mariam is among the beneficiaries of "I Can" project and has also received an encouragement prize, a sewing machine. Currently she has orders from individuals as well as stage performance orders. The machine helped grant her a chance to open a production line for children's clothing. She is planning to create new clothing line called DERCAN only for clothes with Armenian design and ornaments.

Component 3: Maximize the benefits of socioeconomic recovery for the host communities and the displaced population through sustainable energy solutions.

2022

- 7 solar panels were provided to 7 settlements (Shurnukh, Davit Bek, Yeghvard, Tsav, Artsvanik, Syunik, Vorotan) of Syunik region benefiting 2556 people (1244 men, 1312 women).
- 6 non-pressure thermosyphon Eco 20 / 200l water heaters, together with pumps are installed in the newly renovated multi apartment building in Vorotan benefiting 30 people (15 males, 15 females).
- 4 more water heaters were provided to Shurnukh settlement of Goris, benefiting 20 people (10 males, 10 females).

⁶ The project "I Can" is a youth-targeted initiative aiming to see behavioral change among youth and motivate them to engage in entrepreneurial and innovational activities. The Project targets youth (18-30 years old). The project offers a cofinancing 80/20 scheme for projects not exceeding USD 10,000.

- 10 off-grid lights as well as 71 light metal columns for street lightning were provided to Shurnukh settlement of Syunik region benefiting 229 people (110 males, 119 females).
- 80 energy saving LED lights were provided to Vorotan settlement, Goris municipality benefiting 241 people (110 males, 131 females).

<u> 2023</u>

• 100 off-grid lights in 10 settlements (Antarashat, Vanek, Archadzor, Dzorastan, Okhtar, Verin Khotanan, Nerkin Khotanan, Norashenik, Davit Bek, Syunik) of Syunik region benefiting 2018 people (1030 men, 1078 women).

V. RISKS AND CHALLENGES

The project has encountered the following 6 main risks:

- Large flow of refugee Armenians
- Continuous escalations on the borders.
- The floating exchange rate of the Armenian Dram, the frequency of rate fluctuations.
- Political instability
- Natural hazards
- High expectations for the target communities versus the limited scope of the project.

The September 19, 2023, military escalation resulted in heavy human losses and casualties, **thousands of Karabakh Armenians**, who fled to the Republic of Armenia. This made the project management to shift from annual plans and targets to the emergency response actions based on the urgent needs of those people. This decision slowed down the speed of the implementation of the planned actions to a certain extent. To compensate for this, the program management is going to request for *two-year non-cost extension* during the upcoming board meeting in November.

Change of the security situation along the border and escalation of the conflict remains the biggest risk for the project. It may create difficulties/security restrictions for operating in certain remote and border communities and impose risk for sustainability of actions. The Project will follow instructions from the UN Department for Safety and Security and of local law enforcement for the trips to affected communities (additional security measures may be considered). In case of absence of restrictions for travelling and project operations in the affected communities, the project interventions should be modified to meet the needs of the target groups and communities, if approved by the donor.

Floating exchange rate of the Armenian Dram and the high frequency of rate fluctuations imposes a risk of budget insufficiency. UNDP has efficient cash/currency management arrangements, and to the extent possible adaptive financial planning will be used. In addition, UNDP will work on attracting additional funds through establishing public-private partnerships, leveraging funds with other organizations / projects operating in the target regions. To mitigate the risk the decision was also made to sign all the contracts in the USD.

The internal political situation changes in the country is another risk that will cause instability and cancel the current policy frameworks and the administrative setup needed for the project implementation. The Project will review its implementation strategy and while the principles will remain intact, the intervention mechanisms may change. In general, the focus of the project is at the local level, hence no serious disruption is expected.

Destructions can affect the Project results. The impact may range from damage to total destruction.

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PLANS FOR 2024

During 2024 the project aims to do the following activities.

- To install street workout equipment in 5 settlements contributing to healthy lifestyle of local population.
- To provide 10 greenhouses to ensure income-generating opportunities of the beneficiaries. To help the beneficiaries to better master agricultural skills greenhouse training 2 sessions will also be organized.
- To found 10 Sweet houses to contribute to the development of local SMEs.
- 6 "Honey-Money" trainings are going to be organized on beekeeping practices. 120 beehives will be provided to the training participants to ensure their income generating opportunities.
- A new business concept is going to be developed, "I am a Master", aimed at supporting **50** young specialists to progress in their fields or gain new skills by providing small grants (the concept will include 5 trainings for about 50 participants).
- To organize 10 "Chir Chir" trainings to develop participants' skills on fruit drying practices. 1000 nets will be distributed to training participants to ensure their income generating opportunities.
- To organize 5 training on mushroom production skills. In addition, 10 sets of equipment for mushroom production will be provided to the training participants to help them to start a new business or expand their businesses.
- 1000 LED lights are going to be provided to 4 settlements.
- 6 solar panels are going to be provided to target communities.
- In addition, *some community infrastructure* may be renovated based on the identified community need.

LESSONS LEARNED

2023

Large inflow of forcibly displaced Karabakh Armenians

The large inflow of forcibly displaced Karabakh Armenians had a significant impact on the previously identified needs of the target communities. Thus, the project team engaged in the reevaluation of those needs via frequently organized field trips. The reevaluation proved that more should be done for livelihood support since it is more tangible, human-centric and result oriented.

<u> 2022</u>

Usage of beehives

Usage of beehives by beneficiaries needs more clear instructions and monitoring mechanisms. Although beneficiaries were informed and the requirement was stated in the Contract, that within 3 days after receiving the beehives, they should be functional, the monitoring of the process showed that a significant percentage of beneficiaries are not using the beehives on purpose. More strong mechanisms for monitoring and return of beehives should be developed.

Idea generation, scaling up

For more effective and efficient usage of funds and resources, the project needs inputs from the community inhabitants: local and displaced people, regarding the project ideas, implementation and follow up. Communities are mostly passive, no initiatives. Project team is inputting huge efforts for idea generation and its successful implementation.

<u> 2021</u>

Availability of data about target groups

Availability of data about target groups (their specific needs, the intensity of their vulnerability, their location, etc.) is key to targeted recovery interventions, hence the project will complete needs assessment prior to the implementation of planned activities, simultaneously launching the interventions for which this exercise is completed.

Procurement of fodder

Procurement of fodder was full of uncertainties which caused significant delay in the overall procurement process. No company applied in the first phase of the announced competition. Prolongation of the announcement resulted in two bidders. The winner of the bid, after one week announced that the company is not able to provide the fodder with the cost mentioned initially. Decision was made to approach the second bidder and start the process of necessary documentation collection. All these steps took significant time, more than planned initially.

Sustainable Housing management models

For building sustainable livelihoods for the displaced population and communities in the bordering regions of Syunik, Gegharkunik and Vayots Dzor the project-initiated research on Sustainable Housing management models. The Assignment started late, due to the complications in the procurement processes. The aim of the assignment is to research and identify sustainable management models of temporary housing and provide recommendations.
