2. Project summary*

Accelerating COVID-19 Recovery for Vulnerable and Marginalized Groups in Cambodia through Providing Assets for Poverty Reduction and Resilience (ACRP) project, implemented by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in close partnership with the General Secretariat of National Social Protection Council, the Ministry of Planning, and the Ministry of Social Affairs, Veterans and Youth Rehabilitation, is designed to strengthen the resilience and improve the livelihoods of populations most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic in Cambodia, funded by the Government of China through the Global Development and South-South Cooperation Fund. This final report highlights the project's key activities and achievements during the implementation period from 1 July 2024 to 30 September 2025.

The project has had a significant impact on vulnerable and marginalized communities throughout five targeted provinces - Kampong Chhnang, Preah Vihear, Battambang, Pailin, and Banteay Meanchey, enhancing their resilience and overall well-being. The project has empowered households to create more secure and sustainable futures. A total of 5,500 households, presenting approximately 27,500 individuals, were carefully selected to ensure that support reached those who needed it most.

The project provided productive assets and tools, chicken packages, and hands-on training to 2,500 IDPoor households, enabling them to establish sustainable livelihoods and reduce dependency. Additionally, health and sanitation supplies were distributed to 3,000 households, with a focus on promoting healthier living conditions and minimizing the risk of disease. Notably, 34% of these households were headed by females. For further details of the health sanitation materials, please refer to the list of materials in the Annex.

An enhancement to local economies has been made by providing 27 small-scale cashew nut communities and agricultural cooperatives with 89 semi-automatic cashew nut peeling machines, allowing 7,295 people (59% women) who are members of the small-scale agricultural cooperatives to produce semi-processed nuts that can sell for up to 10 times more than raw nuts. The experience from this support provides a model to expand to more cooperatives, creating new opportunities to increase incomes across cashew farming communities.

Communication efforts have been significantly enhanced, with key project milestones, such as the asset handover event in Kampong Chhnang province, and 24 handover events were conducted at each targeted commune, receiving strong media coverage. A strong

collaboration with local authorities and stakeholders has played a vital role in ensuring the project's effective implementation and public visibility. The project organized a field visit for board members, including representatives from the Chinese Embassy in Cambodia, to selected communes. This visit provided firsthand insight into household conditions and demonstrated how project interventions contributed to reducing vulnerability.

Additionally, the project facilitated a site visit for the CIDCA evaluation team to the IDPoor programme in Kampong Thom province. The team observed to understand the local context and the IDPoor registration process, followed by a visit to a recipient household. The CIDCA team also visited Romtom Commune in Rovieng District, Preah Vihear province, to assess the progress of the ACRP project, fully funded by China. During a meeting with the commune, the positive impact of the project on household well-being and livelihoods was highlighted.

The project also organized the final field visit for the board members with the presence of the First and Third Secretaries of the Chinese Embassy to observe the project target areas in Battambang and Banteay Meanchey provinces to gather insights from IDPoor households who are the target groups of the project, and sub-national officials, and to build partnerships for project implementation.

“We used to feel forgotten as our commune is very remote. This is the first time someone has come to ask about our needs and what we want. The support from China has changed our lives.” — Commune Chief, Romtom Commune

Proactive measures have been implemented to address challenges such as supplier procurement issues and changes in the circumstances of household recipients, ensuring project momentum is maintained and risks are minimised.

3. Key achievements and project impact*

Output 1: The resilience of poor and marginalized groups is strengthened through productivity improvement and viable income generation activities.

Significant progress was made under the project in relation to procurement to procurement for productive assets, delivery of productive assets, including vegetables, chicken, and semi-automatic cashew nut peeling machines.

Verification and Finalization of Recipient Households

To ensure accurate targeting, a verification visit was conducted in the five target provinces – Kampong Chhnang, Battambang, Pailin, Preah Vihear, and Banteay Meanchey – from January 20 to 26, 2025, in close collaboration with the Department of Identification of Poor Households of the Ministry of Planning (MoP). Led by MoP, this visit validated the 5,500 recipient IDPoor households selected under the project by conducting further assessments to better understand the socio-economic conditions of these households. This process enabled the strategic allocation of households to productive or health asset groups, based on criteria such as age, land access, and migration status. Using data from the IDPoor database³ as the basis, the verification ensured accuracy of the household data and alignment with project objectives (See Annex: list of materials).

Productive Asset Procurement and Distribution

The procurement process for crops and agricultural tools, and chicken packages, was successfully finalised and distributed to households. To ensure the smooth distributions, a comprehensive distribution and handover plan were developed in consultation with key stakeholders and government counterparts, including the Ministry of Planning, the General Secretariat for the National Social Protection Council (GS-NSPC), and the Ministry of Social Affairs, Veterans, and Youth Rehabilitation (MoSVY) and sub-national administrations (SNAs) such as Provincial Department of Planning, Provincial Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fishery, District Offices and Commune Offices (**See Annex: list of materials**). With a detailed plan, full-scale asset distribution and handover were made, targeting 2,500 IDPoor households across the five target provinces. The following is the schedule of the handover of productive assets.

Capacity Building and Training

To enhance the effectiveness of the distributed productive assets, a series of training sessions was conducted by a senior consultant alongside a team of specialists from provincial departments across the five target provinces. These sessions focused on practical techniques in chicken raising and vegetable farming, aiming to equip 2,500 IDPoor households with the knowledge and skills necessary to build sustainable livelihoods.

Rather than offering one-time support, the training was designed to promote long-term self-reliance. It emphasised hands-on, immediately applicable practices tailored to the local context. To reinforce learning, participants in each commune⁴ received workbooks and visual materials, ensuring the training contents are accessible, readable, and understandable (**See Annex: list of materials**). 51 training sessions were delivered, benefiting 341 people (34% women) who are members of the target IDPoor families.

⁴ The trainings are delivered at the community close to the people, thus resulting in high participation rate with the rate of over 92%. A number of spot check visits have been made by UNDP project team and key government counterparts, especially the Sub-national administrations (i.e. Provincial Department of Planning, District Office and Commune Office). Observation showed that the participants demonstrated improved knowledge in their respective training topics.

Cashew Nut Processing Support

⁵ The trainings are being delivered over a period of approximately one month and a half, starting from 24th March 2025 till 16th May 2025.



As part of its agricultural support efforts, the project procured 44 semi-automatic cashew nut peeling machines to enhance productivity and income generation for 14 small-scale cashew-producing communities in Preah Vihear province. This intervention was designed to improve processing efficiency, reduce manual labor, and increase the market competitiveness of locally produced cashews.

In collaboration with the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Forestry, and Fisheries, the project conducted thorough assessments of each community's capacity, infrastructure, and readiness to ensure the effective use of the machines. The first comprehensive distribution and handover plan was developed and implemented, accompanied by technical guidance and capacity-building support to ensure proper operation and maintenance. The distribution and handover took place in June 2025, representing a significant milestone in strengthening the cashew nut value chain and promoting economic resilience among small-scale producers.

As a result of the effective project management and procurement process, the project was able to buy an additional 45 semi-automatic cashew nut peeling machines for an additional 15 agricultural cooperatives (ACs) in Preah Vihear. The final distribution and handover were conducted in September 2025 in collaboration with the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Forestry, and Fisheries.

Output 2: The health of marginalized and vulnerable households and communities is improved through the provision of quality of life enhancing assets.

Significant progress was made in procuring health, sanitation, and quality-of-life enhancing assets in alignment with the project's objectives. The procurement process was successfully completed, with three suppliers contracted to provide 14 different types of essential assets for the target 3,000 IDPoor households.

Following the completion of the procurement process, a detailed distribution plan was developed to streamline the distribution and handover process and guarantee that all households receive the necessary support efficiently. Large-scale distribution and hand-over were scheduled for April 3–10, 2025, across the five target provinces, ensuring timely delivery of these assets to the targeted recipients.

To facilitate the effective handover of health assets, a series of distribution events were organised in collaboration with local administrations, including the Provincial Departments of Planning, District Offices, and Commune Offices. These events played a vital role in ensuring that assets reached the targeted households, ultimately enhancing their health, well-being, and overall quality of life.

Output 3: Project communication visibility.

During the project implementation, the project made great progress in enhancing its **communication and visibility efforts**.

In close collaboration with UNDP's communications unit, the project team successfully developed and shared engaging media content that highlighted key project milestones and also showcased the invaluable contributions of the Government of China.

One of the key highlights was the media coverage of the official asset handover event held on March 20, 2025, in Boribo district, Kampong Chhnang province. This event marked a significant milestone in the ACRP project, celebrating the handover of essential assets to 200 IDPoor households across four communes in Boribor District.

The event was a testament to strong multilateral cooperation, bringing together

key stakeholders and high-level representatives from the Ministry of Planning, MoSVY, GS-NSPC, UNDP, and the Chinese Embassy in Cambodia. Approximately 350 attendees were present, underscoring the commitment of UNDP, the Cambodian government, development partners, and donors to addressing post-pandemic socio-economic challenges.

Another key achievement was the development of a project factsheet which aimed to enhance visibility and understanding of the project's impact. With support from UNDP Communication Unit, a project factsheet and project webpage on UNDP Cambodia were created and shared with relevant stakeholders at both national and sub-national levels. China is willing to work with Cambodia and relevant international organizations to continue strengthening support for the ACRP project under the framework of the Global Development and South-South Cooperation Fund, deepen China-Cambodia cooperation in people's livelihoods and improve the well-being of the Cambodian people effectively, contribute to the achievement of the United Nations 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, and to building a global community of shared future

To showcase the project's impact and ongoing progress, three compelling short video stories were produced. These videos highlight the initiative's significant contributions to reducing poverty, enhancing community resilience, and providing vital support to vulnerable communities. Each story not only illustrates the transformative changes on the ground but also underscores the pivotal role of China as a major donor, whose support has been instrumental in driving these positive outcomes.

4. Major events of the project*

During the course of the project, a range of key activities were successfully carried out to ensure effective implementation and community engagement:

Symbolic Handover Ceremony: One central symbolic handover event was organized to officially mark the commencement of the project and to demonstrate commitment to the targeted communities.

Community-Level Handover Events: A total of 24 handover ceremonies were conducted across each of the targeted communes. These events served to formally distributed productive assets and health sanitation materials to targeted households, fostering transparency and local ownership.

Capacity Building and Training: To empower the targeted households with the necessary knowledge and skills, 51 training sessions were delivered. These sessions focused on

enhancing household resilience, improving livelihoods, and ensuring sustainable use of the productive assets and other materials.

Field Visits for Needs Assessment: Ten field visits were carried out in collaboration with local authorities. These visits aimed to verify the eligibility of selected households and to conduct thorough assessments of their specific needs, ensuring that the project interventions were well-targeted and responsive.

Project Board Site Visits: Two site visits were organized for members of the project board. These visits provided an opportunity for board members to gain firsthand insights into the living conditions of the households and to observe the relevance and potential impact of the project interventions on the communities.



The project also facilitated a visit for the CIDCA evaluation team to the IDPoor programme in Sanko commune, Kampong Svay District, Kampong Thom province. The evaluation team held a brief meeting with the commune chief to gain insight into the overall condition of the commune and the IDPoor registration process. Subsequently, they visited a

family who was a recipient of the IDPoor programme. The CIDCA evaluation team was impressed by the digital IDPoor programme, as they were able to scan the QR code on the card and access the family's information immediately.

The CIDCA evaluation team also took a short visit to Romtom Commune in Rovieng District, Preah Vihear province, to assess the progress of the ACRP project, which is fully funded by China. The team held a meeting with the Commune chief to discuss how the project has positively impacted the well-being and livelihoods of households. The Commune chief appreciated the support from China, noting that it was the first time her commune had received health sanitation materials to improve hygiene and access to clean water. She emphasised the importance of continued support from China for not only providing sanitation materials but also with income-generating activities to help lift them out of poverty.

Following the meeting with the commune, the team paid a visit to a household that had received sanitation materials through the project, as well as the previous household recipient of the GBSP pilot program. This visit provided the CIDCA evaluation team with valuable insight into the significance of hygiene in relation to clean water for families, as well as the impact of livelihood improvements on households transitioning from poverty level 1 to poverty level 2.

ACRP Project Board Meeting: The second project board meeting that was held on 13 June 2025 marked a significant milestone in the project's progress, challenges, achievements, and impacts throughout the project implementation period. The project board meeting was participated in by the project board co-chairs, including UNDP and the General Secretariat for National Social Protection Council (GS-NSPC), project board members, including the National Social Assistance Fund, the Ministry of Planning, the Ministry of Interior, and the Cambodian Disabled People's Organization.

Semi-automatic Cashew Nut Peeling Machine Handover: UNDP organized two handover missions to Preah Vihear province to distribute 89 semi-automatic peeling machines to 29 small-scale agricultural cooperatives and unions, one in June and another in September 2025. The initiative was designed to strengthen community capacity for value addition and productivity improvement, thereby contributing directly to poverty reduction and sustainable local development. The mission also served to recognize and highlight the significant contribution of the Government of China in supporting Cambodia's socio-economic recovery and resilience-building.

During the handover, sub-national authorities formally acknowledged the support of the Government of China and UNDP Cambodia under the ACRP initiative. They emphasized the role of asset-based social protection measures in accelerating post-pandemic recovery, reducing poverty, and enhancing community resilience. In addition to transferring productive assets, the mission provided an important opportunity to engage directly with small-scale cashew nut communities, enabling a better understanding of their challenges and opportunities. This collaborative effort underscored the project's multi-stakeholder approach and alignment with Cambodia's national development priorities.



Final Project Field Visit: The final ACRP field visit was organized in September 2025 to observe the project target areas in Battambang and Banteay Meanchey provinces. It was conducted to assess the effectiveness and relevance of the project interventions at the community level. It sought to monitor the outcomes of the productive and health assets distributed, not only in terms of their immediate use but also their contribution to improving household resilience and livelihoods. The mission team, including the First and Third Secretaries of the Chinese Embassy, project board co-chairs, and members, met local authorities, communities, and households that received the productive and health assets from the project. Through direct engagement with target groups, the mission team captured perspectives on how the project's support has translated into tangible changes in living conditions and economic opportunities.

5. Monitoring and evaluation*

Despite the substantial progress achieved by the project, several challenges emerged that required timely and strategic interventions to maintain momentum and ensure successful implementation:

Supplier Engagement for Productive Assets: One of the most pressing challenges was the difficulty in securing suppliers for the provision of productive assets. The Invitation to Bid (ITB) process demanded significant upfront investments from suppliers, which created hesitation among potential bidders. To overcome this barrier, the project extended the bidding timeline and proactively engaged with prospective suppliers. The project reached out to potential suppliers to inform them of the opportunities available, ultimately encouraging greater interest and competition in the procurement process.

Household Eligibility Changes: Another challenge stemmed from changes in the family situation of selected household recipients. These included instances of migration for employment and the unfortunate passing of household members, which affected eligibility

for asset support. In response, the project conducted comprehensive verification visits across all five target provinces. These visits aimed to reassess household eligibility and ensure that support was directed to those who met the criteria. The project collaborated closely with local authorities, particularly Commune Offices, to identify and replace households that were no longer eligible, thereby maintaining the integrity and fairness of the selection process.

Flooding and Logistical Constraints: Seasonal flooding in certain target communes, especially in Kampong Chhnang province, posed significant logistical challenges, hindering access to some areas. Anticipating these difficulties, the project team adopted a proactive approach by selecting distribution sites that were both accessible and resilient to flooding. This careful planning ensured that all eligible households could participate in the asset distribution and project handover events without disruption, reinforcing the project's commitment to inclusivity and operational efficiency.

Evaluation from Final Project Field Visit:

The final project field visit provided valuable insights into the implementation and impact of project interventions at the community level. The community leaders and IDPoor households highlighted several positive outcomes of the project. Households benefited from productive assets such as vegetable seeds and chickens, which supported both income generation and food consumption. Vegetable growing was particularly successful, enabling households to generate income and share produce with neighbors when planting space was limited. Livestock training helped beneficiaries understand basic animal care and management, while hygiene and sanitation assets improved household practices. Education outcomes were also noted, with some families able to send children and grandchildren to school due to increased household income.

However, challenges emerged, including the loss of chickens shortly after distribution, poor egg production since May, and difficulties in adapting to raising non-local breeds. The local community leaders and households requested additional training in raising chickens, growing vegetables, and sanitation practices to maximize asset utilization. The household recovery in post-conflict settings and the registration of refugees were also highlighted. It was noted that displacement during conflict disrupted households' ability to fully utilize the distributed assets, as some families had to abandon them.

Feedback from sub-national officials from NSPC, MoP, NSAF, and the Embassy of China in Cambodia, as a donor, emphasized both achievements and limitations. The distribution of

assets contributed to improved livelihoods, but challenges included the limited duration of the project (one year), lack of monitoring and follow-up, and technical gaps among households in areas such as school feeding, chicken raising, and vegetable farming. Officials also highlighted that procuring local chicken breeds would have been more effective, as they are better adapted to local rearing practices. Furthermore, external shocks such as flooding affected vegetable production, while logistical issues in distribution weakened the condition of some livestock.

The mission confirmed that the project has had a visible positive impact on households, with improved food security, livelihoods, and resilience. At the same time, it highlighted the lesson learned as below:

- Non-local livestock breeds faced difficulties adapting to local conditions, highlighting the importance of context-specific asset selection (e.g., procuring local chicken breeds).
- Households lacked sufficient technical knowledge in animal husbandry, vegetable cultivation, and sanitation practices, which reduced the long-term effectiveness of distributed assets.
- Follow-Up and Monitoring Strengthen Outcomes: The short project duration limited opportunities for sustained training, monitoring, and technical support, reducing the project's ability to address challenges and ensure sustained outcomes.
- Environmental factors such as flooding significantly affected agricultural outputs, underlining the need for climate-sensitive planning.
- Beneficiaries demonstrated community solidarity, with some households sharing inputs (e.g., vegetable crops) when others lacked planting space, reinforcing the role of social cohesion in resilience.
- In areas affected by conflict or displacement, households faced difficulties maintaining assets, highlighting the need for flexibility and contingency measures in project design.

Key recommendations:

- Future procurement should prioritize local breeds and crops that are better adapted to community conditions, thereby improving survival rates and productivity.
- Provide comprehensive and ongoing training for beneficiaries on livestock rearing, vegetable cultivation, health, and sanitation, coupled with practical demonstrations and refresher sessions.
- Establish stronger mechanisms for continuous monitoring, technical support, and problem-solving at the community level, ideally extending beyond the short project cycle.

- Integrate Climate and Disaster Risk Measures: Introduce flood-resilient agricultural techniques and promote climate-smart practices to safeguard livelihoods against environmental shocks.
- Formalize and encourage community-based approaches such as shared use of inputs and peer-to-peer learning to strengthen collective resilience.
- Develop contingency measures for conflict or displacement situations to protect assets and support household in maintaining everyday subsistence and developing new or adaptive productive capacity.

6. Communications and publicity activities*

The project made significant progress in strengthening communication and visibility efforts. In collaboration with UNDP's communications unit, it produced and disseminated a range of videos and media content that highlighted key milestones and showcased the contributions of the Government of China. These materials were widely shared across major social media platforms Facebook, LinkedIn, X, and Instagram generating strong public engagement and raising awareness of the project's objectives.

The first campaign promoted the LPAC meeting held on August 13, 2024, emphasizing China's vital role as a donor supporting poverty alleviation in Cambodia. The second campaign spotlighted field visits and consultations with sub-national authorities to identify potential recipient households for asset transfers. Both campaigns attracted considerable attention online. Additionally, field visits conducted to project sites, reinforcing the joint efforts of UNDP, China, and the Cambodian government in tackling poverty.

To further highlight China's role, a short video featuring a high-level representative from the Chinese Embassy in Cambodia was produced and shared across UNDP's main social media channels. This campaign significantly boosted the project's visibility and public recognition of China's support for Cambodia's recovery and poverty reduction efforts.

Another video featured UNDP's Deputy Resident Representative, who emphasized the project's inclusive and participatory approach. It underscored the collaboration between UNDP, the Government of China, and the Royal Government of Cambodia in enhancing community resilience and addressing poverty and inequality.

To encapsulate the project's overall impact, a comprehensive final video was produced, reflecting its commitment to transparency and donor visibility. A series of success stories



and household testimonials were also developed to humanize and personalize the project's achievements.


