Progress Report

January -June 2014

During the reporting period, a number of projects that were funded as part of the first round of funding ended while few others are in the closing phase. As for the projects for second round of funding in East Jerusalem, contracts were signed with ten organizations to implement projects in various fields such as renovation of schools, support employment of marginalized women and provision of space for sports and cultural activities, and support uninsured and visually impaired Jerusalemites. In close coordination with the Ministry of Planning and Administrative Development, Ministry of Local Government, Ministry of Agriculture and Ministry of Jerusalem Affairs, the Call for Proposals for the third round of funding was announced on 29th of May 2014. Building on the Community Assessment study targeted geographical areas for this round are: South Hebron, Jerusalem Governorate (East Jerusalem, Bedouin communities, North West of Jerusalem Governorates), Jordan Valley and Seam Zone. Selection of successful proposals will be done according to the main priorities (specified for each geographical area) of this round, which are: education, health, water, social welfare, economic development and agriculture. As a result of progress of all projects, projects' results contributed to CRDP four outputs, as originally planned. The second year report will provide in-depth information about the impact of the projects in the first round, progress of second round projects and an update on the status of the projects that will be selected as part of the third round of funding. The CRDP team is currently utilizing additional monitoring and evaluation activities in parallel to partners' efforts in reporting on the outcome of projects from both resilience and development perspectives.

Part I Progress versus CRDP outputs

The following part provides a cumulative progress against CRDP outputs from the start of the programme on October 1st, 2012 until this date.

Output 1: Public and Social Infrastructure in Area C and EJ improved

Under the **education sector**, quality of education and infrastructure of a number of schools in the most marginalized and threatened areas were improved. A total of 911 students in Area C and Seam Zone were provided with improved existing physical learning environment through rehabilitation of 38 school units (86% of targeted schools facilities). School units include classrooms, offices, toilets, playgrounds, computer and science labs and libraries.

As part of one of the educational projects in the Seam Zone, resilience of people was strengthened as a result to replacement of the classroom and office tents (provided for humanitarian purposes) by rooms (classrooms, offices and toilets) made from material from environment (e.g. hay and mud). The playground of the school was also rehabilitated. A 100%

of the students of the community are now studying in a better learning environment. Female students, whose families were reluctant to send them to nearby schools so as not to pass through the humiliation of security inspection, are now encouraged to pursue their education in their community. On another level, the readiness and participation of the community was enhanced by committing to designate a nearby parcel of land to expand the existing school so as to accommodate more students. Other actors are currently approaching the community to assist the people in various fields. Consequently the adaptive capacity of targeted Bedouin community was enhanced and their ability to mitigate the negative effects of the Wall was enhanced.

Moreover, as part of one of the educational projects in Area C, 186 students and 81 teachers have participated in a wide-scale of capacity building programme and in community service learning projects aimed at enhancing the quality of teaching and strengthening community-school relationship. Also, as part of this project targeting five marginalized communities in South Hebron hills in Area C the intervention contributed to the improvement of the schools' physical conditions, the provision of a safe and child-friendly space to study, the adoption of new teaching and learning approaches and strengthening community relationships. The high community support of these projects was instrumental in strengthening the school-community relationship. At the same time various communities were committed to provide all the support needed driven by strong belief in the benefits of education for males and females in providing future diversified sources of income and therefore resilience of their families.

In one of the targeted locations one of the projects was built on humanitarian projects by means of rehabilitation of classroom caravans and other infrastructure provided by OCHA. In other locations, the community momentum resulted from community mobilization has led to the construction of new schools by other programmes.

In **East Jerusalem**, education projects contributed to other unique resilience-based results. As the set of risks in East Jerusalem are different than those in Area C these projects contributed to enhancement of quality and relevancy (education-market) of vocational training programmes and the creation of jobs, and increased youth employability along expanding the provision of a combination of educational and psychosocial services. One of the projects implemented in the Old City contributed to strengthening resilience of 80 women and 318 male and female children and youth by facilitating special education counseling for children and their mothers. Having this achieved, the trained mothers and youth are able to provide similar services and training to other mothers and children in need. The psychosocial status of any community is key to their resilience and ability to develop.

Another project has developed and upgraded four courses based on market demand and institutionalized them in three major vocational centers/schools in East Jerusalem. Educational infrastructure of one of the vocational schools has also been rehabilitated so as to provide sustainable quality education. In addition to increasing the awareness of hundreds of youth in regard to offerings of vocational schools in East Jerusalem and aimed at supporting

marginalized youth, the project supported 70 out of 86 students (55% females) participating in long-term courses. (Note: employability indicator is contributing to Output 3.)

The third educational project in East Jerusalem has established a modern and first of its kind facility that will provide top of the art courses in the field of animation and multimedia that is demanded in the market. A group of female and male participants has already completed an intensive course. The college is currently expanding in promoting the new courses to both college students and participants from East Jerusalem neighborhoods. The preliminary feedback was extremely positive particularly from females who expressed willingness to start their own home-based business in the field. More results on this project will be collected in the next reporting period.

Under the **health sector, in East Jerusalem**, a community based health organization was able to mobilize around 3,000 Jerusalemites and enhance their adaptive capacity to deal with risks and disasters, particularly during clashes with Israeli authorities at Al Aqsa Mosque area and other areas in East Jerusalem. Three professional teams were also trained and deployed to provide emergency support to areas that are not covered by the Israeli medical organizations. Moreover, emergency health services to 45 residents using a special emergency vehicle during the extreme weather conditions were provided.

In Area C, three Bedouin communities, including 188 people of chronic diseases, 500 children, have improved access to health services (60% of Year 1 target). Aiming at building the knowledge inside communities so as to mitigate extreme livelihood conditions knowledge of health issues and challenges facing Bedouin communities were transferred to 26 Bedouin women from three Bedouin communities. This group of community leaders did not only provide a leading model to other female Bedouins but they also coordinated with other health providers in conducting medical visits while maintaining a database of health situation in their communities. These community leaders were able to mobilize 90 other volunteers during various health related activities.

Under the **energy sector, in Area C**, a total of 127 households (making a population of 790) in various Bedouin communities in the Jordan Valley and Bethlehem Governorate were provided with access to electricity via solar units. This provision led to an increase in studying hours of students by an average of 4 hours a day, improved health conditions and storage of food and dairy products as a result of the installation of small refrigerators, butter churns and solar lights and enhanced physical security by lighting the surroundings and charging mobile phones. In addition, the provision of mobile PV units saved time and energy for working women and saved on energy expenses at an average of USD90 per month for each of the households that relied on fuel for the generation of electricity. These mobile units have also reduced the risk of demolition by installing them in a way that could be easily dismantled and re-allocated during risks of demolitions.

Output 2: Improved Access to and Protection of natural Resources

Being the most important need among communities and localities in Area C access to water (for both domestic and agricultural use) was targeted by four projects. A total of 132 households with a total of 1010 people benefited from increased accessibility to water resources.

In eastern slopes in Area C, 58 water cisterns have been rehabilitated in five marginalized communities. In addition, a total of 2,700 working days were created for skilled and unskilled workers. The harvested water is estimated by a total of up to 5,220 m3 in the 58 cisterns saving a total of 106,960 NIS per year when compared to purchasing of water for the same quantity.

In Al Ma'sarah, in Area C, another threatened location in Bethlehem area adjacent to settlements, a historical place has been restored, consisting of an olive press, an old house, an

old spring, a cave and a water-well and rehabilitation of adjacent four dunums of land has been completed. More Palestinian and international visitors are currently visiting the area to show solidarity with the threatened community and therefore contributed to the increase of the overall security of the community.

Output 3: Economic Opportunities Enhanced Through Support to Livelihoods

Agricultural related economic opportunities:

A total of 335 households benefited from four projects and a total of 1,441 dunums were rehabilitated and utilized. In Seam Zone, rehabilitation of 23% of underground wells were completed and led to an average reduction of 50% in cost of water and an increase of 40% in number of farmers farming their lands in the area. In Area C, 4.9 km of agriculture roads connected five communities were completed. This paved the way for the reclamation of 1,183 dunums and protection of two threatened areas.

Non-agricultural related economic opportunities:

In Area C, a total of 172 households were supported to improve their income, of which 55% are women-headed households (30% of Year 1 target). In East Jerusalem, as a result to other interventions (vocational training, animation and multi-media training mentioned above), 29 Jerusalemites (48% female) were employed until this date.

As part of supporting the Bedouin communities in east of Jerusalem governorate sewing machines were distributed to establish a sewing center at each of the three targeted Bedouin communities. As demanded by the communities themselves these centers will provide additional sources of income to a population of 474. They will also reduce the burden on Bedouin women to travel to neighboring towns to repair their clothes.

In other marginalized communities in Bethlehem and Hebron areas a total of 32 womenheaded households were supported to start micro businesses and livelihood projects. Examples of these projects are grocery, poultry farming, sheep breeding and vegetable nurseries. Amenah, a lady who started the grocery project, pointed out that the project has been helpful to her as an individual and also to the whole community as people don't have to travel to the nearby villages or cities to get the items they need while available in the grocery.

In Bili'in, a large livelihood project located west of Ramallah has completed the terracing of 140 dunums of land in addition to founding the main facilities of the community park. A number of land owners and farmers in the area will directly benefit from this project along thousands of residents in Ramallah area. Work is still ongoing in Bili'in. The uniqueness of the project is that it revives a liberated land and builds on results of other previous agriculture and infrastructure projects in the area. Other donors and residents are also investing in the area.

In extension of the restoration of a historical place in Al Ma'sarah in Bethlehem area mentioned above, 40 women-headed households have increased their income through selling of embroidery and food items to increasing number of Palestinian and international visitors to the area.

Output 4: Rights of Palestinians are upheld

Under this output three out of four projects are implemented in East Jerusalem and the fourth is implemented in Area C. Considering the uniqueness of needs in the Old City of East Jerusalem two of the projects targeted youth, women and children by providing them with a physical space to interact, develop life skills and participate in various cultural and sports activities. In total, 147 women, 60 children and 79 youth participated in various activities so as to provide a positive model to their peers that they could be active members in their communities. Four community initiatives were organized and six neighborhood committees were established.

The third East Jerusalem project focused on transferring the knowledge and expertise in building a nucleus Palestinian municipality in East Jerusalem. Pursuant to this goal, 26 community leaders were provided with access to municipality information and trained in various areas on how to deal with the Jerusalem Municipality and build the knowledge for the future Palestinian municipality.

The fourth project implemented in marginalized areas in South Hebron, in Area C, contributed to the targeted communities' adaptive capacity to mitigate risks by means of empowering them to defend their sustenance in their communities. In this regard and combined with livelihood support mentioned above, 141 community members have received three specialized training on media and documentation of human rights violations and/or displacement incidents.

Part II Risks

Until this date, three partners faced occupation-related risks. Details are as follows:

A. On December 23, 2013, and during the rehabilitation of lands in Jabal Abu Zeid, in Bethlehem governorate by **ACTED** ICA confiscated the contractor's bulldozer claiming that the land is state-owned. ACTED informed their lawyer, Mr Sani Khuri, who managed to release the confiscated bulldozer. On April 10, 2014, ICA demolished an area of 4 dunums. Farmers started rebuilding the demolished terraces with the help of volunteers from Combatants for Peace and the World Council of Churches.

Moreover, between June 30th and July 1st, 2014 a total of 20 water tanks that were provided by the CRDP were confiscated by the ICA. As per ACTED's lawyer, the main issue for ICA is the agricultural road, not the water tanks. CRDP team is currently following up with ACTED on the issue.

B. On October 27, 2013, a stop work order was issued to one of the facilities supported by CRDP in Bilin's echo park implemented by **T'awon**. Bili'in community assigned a lawyer in coordination with the Popular Committee in Bilin and petitioned the case with Israeli courts. Until this date, no escalation was noticed from the Israeli authorities and works in the area has resumed.

C. On March 26, 2014, and during the implementation of **We Effect**'s project in the Seam Zone, confiscation of materials took place on March 26, 2014. ICA confiscated materials and

equipment needed for the rehabilitation of Hableh well. Several meetings took place between Frode Mauring, the Special Representative of the Administrator of UNDP, Khaled Shahwan, Deputy Special Representative for Operations, Mohammad Khaled, Country Director of We Effect and the Swedish Consulate so as to release the equipment. On June 25, 2014, ICA released the equipment and installation at the site has been completed. However, the ICA did not allow to connect the installed pump via electricity. The well is now operational using the diesel engine until connection to electricity is permitted.

Part III Achievements and administrative updates

Signing contracts as part of the second round of funding

In presence of Ministries of Planning and Administrative Development and Jerusalem Affairs and CRDP donors the UNDP's Programme of Assistance to the Palestinian People signed agreements with 10 NGOs on 27th March, 2014 with a total amount of USD 1.2 million. Projects provide support to interventions in various sectors such as education, economic development and culture and heritage.

Launching the third call for proposals (CfPs)

As per Review Board's recommendation the third call for proposals for the third round of funding of CRDP was launched in May 2014 with a total amount of USD 5 million to support projects in Area C and East Jerusalem. The targeted geographical areas for this round are: South Hebron, Jerusalem Governorate (East Jerusalem, Bedouin communities, North West of Jerusalem Governorates), Jordan Valley and Seam Zone. Selection of proposals will be according to the main priorities of this round which are education, health, housing, energy, social welfare and agriculture.

The third round of funding was designed based on the findings of the community assessment conducted in 100 localities and communities in Area C in addition to national priorities of the Palestinian government as reflected in the plans of the ministry of Planning and Administrative Development, Ministry of Jerusalem Affairs, Ministry of Local Government and Ministry of Agriculture.

Networking and Consultation events

As part of strengthening relationships among implementing partners as well as exchanging experiences and sharing information, CRDP team conducted two workshops: one for partners working in East Jerusalem and the other for partners working in Area C. Both workshops were

attended by representatives from partners, ministries and donors. In both workshops, there was a discussion on the best mechanisms to implement the projects in light of the challenges partners have been facing and on the most effective interventions so as to reach the desired impact in strengthening resilience of Palestinian people.

Area C workshop took place in Ramallah on June 10, 2014 and was attended by around 25 persons representing partner organizations for the first round of funding, donors and MOPAD. The following points were risks and challenges highlighted during the discussion:

- Risks associated with settlers and ICA practices in Area C.
- The psychological aspects as people are afraid of living in Area C.
- The vision of the Palestinian authority is not clear with regard to Area C planning and development. There is a need for more work on raising people's awareness of their rights in Area C.
- Land and equipment confiscation by Israeli soldiers, fees associated and the ICA attempts to forcing Palestinians to sign a document that they will not work in Area C.
- Duplication of projects and interventions in the same area by different actors.
- Organizations need more clarifications on how to use contingency money in CRDP projects. Partners were contracted and met to discuss this issue; however, they still need more clarifications.
- The issue of dealing with media as its effect and role can be positive or negative.
- There is a need to conduct a practical research and guidelines on Area C. The research would map all areas and indicated the types and levels of risks and the attainable technical measures.

The **East Jerusalem workshop** was held in Jerusalem on June 3, 2014 and it was attended by 30 representatives from partners from both the first and second rounds of funding. Sida has also attended the workshop. CRDP PMU facilitated the meeting so as to focus on exploring the sectors of priorities in EJ along identifying areas of interventions that could be targeted by CRDP. The below is a summary of the feedback:

- Support the viability of EJ NGOs
- Support comprehensive and long-term programmes
- Education, economic development, legal aid, housing and allocation of green spaces for Jerusalemites are the main sectors in need of support
