2.1 Overall (summary) project progress



#### 2.1.1: Overall project progress

The GCF project on "Enhancing Climate Resilience of India's Coastal Communities" is a first of a kind initiative in the country, working on large-scale sustainable coastal management. The project is being implemented by the Ministry of Environment, Forest, and Climate Change and the three State Governments of Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, and Odisha, with UNDP as the Accredited Entity. The project has made progress in establishing the necessary institutional mechanisms for project management since 2019. However, the implementation of project activities has been delayed due to impacts of COVID-19 (2020-2021) and other key operational issues, which caused a delay in overall project progress. To date, 10% of the total GCF grant (first tranche of 4.565 million) has been made to the project from GCF since inception. The project has an accumulative delivery, inclusive of a commitment of 930,253.91 at the end of 2021. Key milestones till date include:

#### **Preparatory Activities:**

- · National Inception Workshop held with all stakeholders on 13 November 2019.
- Baseline Assessment Survey conducted from November-December 2019.
- Key national level assignments initiated, including the Pan-India Vulnerability Assessment, Study of existing schemes/programs for Coastal areas and the designing of the communication strategy for the project.
- Dialogues conducted with key international and national stakeholders working in coastal development in India including World Bank, NCSCM and GIZ

#### **Project Management Structures and Governing Mechanisms**

- Staff for State Project Management Unit (SPMU) in Odisha and Maharashtra have been appointed by UNDP as requested by Ministry/State governments (8 officials). The State of Andhra Pradesh has informed UNDP to initiate the process of SPMU establishment in the state. UNDP intends to fast track this recruitment for the SPMU to be established by quarter 2 of 2022.
- National and State level Steering committees have been established and are operational.

#### Key State level interventions

- · Odisha and Maharashtra have initiated delineation of project landscapes along with the identification of villages and target beneficiaries.
- · States have set up state and district level project coordination structures for implementation and monitoring of project activities
- Mangrove nurseries have been established in 4 project districts in Maharashtra. In addition, state level trainings have been initiated for livelihood support for crab farming, oyster farming and ornamental fishery. (co-finance)



- States were provided support for developing a roster of eligible NGOs for the implementation of ecosystem restoration and sustainable livelihood initiatives.
- · Conducted a field exposure visit for Odisha and Maharashtra to one of the target landscapes to foster cross-learning and exchange.

#### Reasons of Delay

- Onset of COVID-19 in 2020 and first half of 2021: The pandemic caused significant delay in field implementation of activities in all three target states. Due to lockdowns and travel restrictions, project staff were unable to visit target landscapes for the initial activities that were planned in early 2020. In addition, the appointed NPD during this phase advised the States and UNDP to pause implementation of project activities in early 2020 to enable planning and review of activities at a schedule that suits national priorities.
- Similarly, with the second wave of COVID-19 in India in early 2021, key project activities were significantly delayed. Further, priorities of National and State partners were aligned towards mitigating the effects of the pandemic, which also led to an overall delay in project implementation.
- Institutional Changes proposed by NDA: In 2021, the newly appointed NDA proposed a change to the funding mechanism under the project. This resulted in delay in the first tranche of fund transfer to the States. With consultation amongst all project partners, an amendment was made to the funding mechanism where UNDP would make direct cash advances to the three target states. This has been reported to GCF in June 2021. With this, the first tranche of funds has been disbursed to two states in October 2021.

#### **Revised Implementation Strategy**

- UNDP as the accredited entity met the NDA on a regular basis to ensure all project partners are aware and informed of the project status and possible repercussions for the delay in implementation. Accordingly, a revised implementation plan (till June 2025) has been drafted considering the 1.5 2-year delay. This plan involves accelerating implementation of project activities on a priority basis in the next two years to ensure completion of project deliverables by June 2025.
- UNDP also met the three State Project Directors in the target States to ensure that all planning processes are aligned as per schedule. This includes all reporting requirements as well as planning project implementation till 2025.
- A national level review meeting is being planned to be held in January 2022 to take stock of progress and ensure all project partners are in line to ensure implementation of the project within the given duration of the project.

While project activities have accelerated since the last quarter of 2021, meeting and workshops will continue to be held in virtual format wherever possible and social distancing protocols will continue to be followed in 2022. The implementation schedule is being updated to reflect the revised timelines in discussion with the project partners and will be finalized after the NPMU is on-board in the first quarter of 2022.

#### 2.2.2 2021 Progress:

As part of Output 1, at the national level, an agency had been contracted to initiate the Vulnerability Assessment (VA) study to assess the extent of risks and vulnerabilities of the coastal communities in the 13 Coastal states of India in 2020. After evaluating the methodology that was submitted by the agency, a collective decision (together with the NDA) was taken to terminate the contract with the existing agency working on the Vulnerability Assessment. The NDA has recommended that the vulnerability assessment be conducted by the National Centre and Sustainable Coastal Management



(NCSCM), which has more experience in conducting national level coastal VA's. The discussion with NCSCM is on-going and will be discussed at the next National Project Steering Committee Meeting.

In Maharashtra, the SPMU has visited all 11 target landscapes, with Preliminary identification of villages completed mainly based on the scope for ecosystem restoration work and climate adaptive livelihoods interventions. Micro Plans for 17 villages were prepared and submitted for approval of Deputy Conservator of Forest, which will form an integral part of the Target landscape integrated management plans (TLIMPs). The process of formation of Mangrove Conservation and Co-Management committees have also been identified in the villages.

The State of **Odisha** followed a consultative process with consideration of scientific data and GIS based images for delineation of boundaries of seven landscapes. Scientists from the technical institutes like Odisha Remote Sensing Application Centre (ORSAC), Odisha Climate Change Cell and Chilika Development Authority (CDA) and Integrated Coastal Zone Management Society (ICZM Society) were consulted. Divisional Forest Officers (Wildlife), Forest, Environment and Climate Change Department, Govt. of Odisha have further done ground truthing exercises with their field staffs. Technical experts have submitted a list of potential patches along with the area and geo-coordinates for restoration of mangroves in selected project landscapes in the State.

**Under Output 2**, With the travel restrictions in place, field level implementation was severely affected at State level. The State of Odisha developed concept notes on various livelihood interventions (SRI, Oyster farming, Mussel farming, Ornamental fishery, mangrove, watershed, seagrass etc in consultation with technical experts in the State. In Maharashtra, the SPMU has identified sites for the set-up of aquaculture units, where 7 pearl spot fish nursery units, 27 sea bass cage culture units, 24 units of mussel farming, 4 units of oyster farming are being established across the select project landscapes.

**Under Output 3**. The study for identifying the existing schemes/programmes/institutions for India's coastal areas has been completed and serves as a baseline study for all project partners. In addition, a prototype of a digital platform has been developed as a "solutions exchange" platform which will support the formation of the pan-India coastal development network.

#### 2.1.3 Update on Project Risks

(1) The pandemic posed as a significant risk to overall project implementation (kindly refer to section above). As requested by the NDA, States have incorporated these risks in the revised implementation plan to fast-track state level activities. Regular meetings will be held and national and state level to ensure project progress is on track.

(2) On 14 January 2021, SECU determined the complaint filed by the Democratic Traditional Fishers Workers Forum under the project to be eligible. The basis for SECU's determination of eligibility was that the mangrove destruction is remotely related to the project's objective (livelihoods and coastal conservation) and occurred within the project's area of influence. Indian courts are examining the legal issues surrounding the felling of the mangrove forest. In May 2021, -SECU decided to postpone the investigation for six months (till November 2021) in light of the sharp rise in COVID-19 cases across India. The next steps are expected to take place in 2022.

#### 2.2 Performance against the GCF investment criteria (summary)



As mentioned previously, travel restrictions and the overall impacts of the pandemic resulted in limited progress in field level implementation. the State of Maharashtra has completed the delineation of landscapes in consultation with community groups. Aquaculture units have been set up in target landscapes and are expected to be operational in 2022. Technical consultations have taken place at state level to support in identifying potential landscapes in Odisha. Further, Regular briefing meetings have been held with the NDA and three target states to update on the latest developments under the project. In addition, learning exchange dialogues and discussions have taken place with national level knowledge players in the field.

#### 2.2.1 Impact Potential

The State of Maharashtra (through co-finance) has accelerated the establishment of aquaculture-related units, which will be operational once Covid-19 restrictions have been lifted. This includes the setup of seven pearl spot fish nursery units, 27 seabass cage culture units, 24 units of mussel farming and 4 units of oyster farming in the target landscapes.

The State of Odisha has initiated the delineation of landscapes and the identification of areas for ecosystem restoration and sustainable livelihoods. Profiles of project landscapes have been developed on various livelihood interventions (SRI, Oyster farming, Mussel farming, Ornamental fishery, mangrove, watershed, seagrass etc.), ready to be implemented in 2022. The State of Andhra Pradesh has informed that the SPMU will be established by the second quarter of 2022 with a plan to fast track the implementation of field activities.

As envisaged in the project document, the main adaptation impacts will be achieved through work in the three target project states on Activity 1.2 (restoration), and Activities 2.1 and 2.2 (livelihoods). Most field-level activities will be implemented in 2022 with appropriate safeguard mechanisms and procedures in place.



#### 2.2.2 Paradigm shift potential

#### > Potential for scaling up and replication

The GCF project supports the Government of India to enhance the resilience of vulnerable coastal communities to climate change through ecosystem-based adaptation (EbA). The project is setting precedence in demonstrating new practices, avoiding duplication of efforts and building the capacities of local bodies and local communities to ensure sustainability.

The target landscapes have been delineated in Maharashtra and Odisha. Field activities in the landscapes have been limited due to the pandemic, especially in the first half of 2021 due to the second potent COVID-19 wave. Meanwhile, States have prepared detailed landscape-specific interventions which will be initiated in 2022 with appropriate safeguard measures in place. This includes holding consultations with communities for their consent of the project interventions being implemented in the respective landscapes/villages. These interventions will be helpful to assess how best to replicate such initiatives state-wide through local and state government structures at various levels. Part of the Government co-finance of Odisha mobilised during the reporting period is being channelled towards the preparation of the Target Landscape Integrated Management plans (TLIMP) which is indictive of the State Government's broad outlook and commitment in bringing a paradigm shift towards a new approach to integrate eco-system / nature-based solution and community centric approach to adaptation planning and implementation. The said TLIMP will include the public and private sector as well as civil society entities.

#### > Potential for knowledge sharing and learning

In 2021, a "Study of existing schemes/programs for Coastal areas and identification of institutions for networking opportunities" was completed which identified institutions (South Asian regional, national and state level) for networking opportunities through the assessment of current schemes/programs related to coastal area. This will serve as a baseline study for the NDA/target states to identify potential areas of collaboration and for promoting convergence and knowledge sharing.

A digital solution exchange platform has been developed to act as an inter-departmental platform for the 13 coastal states of India which will be used to support the integration of ecosystem- and community-based measures into specific policies and plans as well as into budgetary processes for comprehensive and integrated coastal adaptation planning and governance. The platform is in its pilot phase and will be launched in early 2022.

In the latter half of 2021, a field exposure visit in one of the target landscapes was organised for the State of Odisha and Maharashtra which fostered cross learning between the two states on management best practices being implemented on ground by both states in terms of ecosystem restoration and implementation of sustainable livelihoods.

#### > Contribution to the creation of an enabling environment

Regular briefing meetings have been held with the NDA and three target states to update on the latest developments under the project. In addition, learning exchange dialogues and discussions have taken place with national level knowledge players in the field. This includes the World Bank (potential convergence with the Integrated Coastal Zone Management project at national and state level), GIZ (best practices of landscape level interventions in target states) and the National Centre on Sustainable Coastal Management which supports the MoEFCC in the integrated management of coastal and marine environment for livelihood security, sustainable development and hazard risk management.

Further, state level visits were organised to ensure that State partners were planning the implementation of the project through inter-departmental coordination. In Odisha, consultative meetings have been held with key project stakeholders such as Chilika Development Authority, the State Climate Change Cell and Integrated Coastal Zone Management Society on planning implementation of the project. Similarly, Maharashtra has held various dialogues with relevant stakeholders in the state, which includes Maharashtra Maritime Board, Department of Agriculture (for implementation of SRI and watershed restoration) and Department of Fisheries (fish value addition activities).

Pan-India coastal workshops will be held in 2022 with all relevant national and state stakeholders to create a platform for discussion on integrating ecosystem-centric approaches into public and private sector policies, plans and budgets.



#### 2.2.3 Sustainable development potential

While most of the field level implementation halted due to the pandemic, planning at state level for landscape intervention has taken place. The Government of Odisha has planned a ridge to reef approach to be included in the Target Integrated Landscape Management Plan and relevant line departments, communities, private and civil society organisations would be consulted. Further, engagement of women driven Self Help Groups (SHGs) is planned to lead the project implementation including planning, financing, implementing, and monitoring of project activities. In addition, during consultations held with women SHGs in the landscapes, it was consensually agreed to engage women as, "Climate Champions" at village level, who would facilitate and support implementation of the project activities including community mobilization and creation of awareness on climate change at the grass root level. In Maharashtra, the focus has been on forming Mangrove Co-management committees (MCMCs) in the preliminary identified villages. These MCMCs will be registered under Indian Societies act 1860 and will act as co-management structures that are responsible for conservation and protection of Mangrove area. In addition, the State of Maharashtra has also established aquaculture units in the target landscapes with community consent, which will be operational in 2022.

The detailed information on progress on Environmental co-benefits, Economic co-benefits and Gender-sensitive development impact will be reported in the next APR.

#### 2.2.4 Needs of the recipient

During the reporting period, the coastal zone of India has experienced extreme weather events with the occurrence of cyclones, heavy rains etc leading to increased vulnerability of coastal communities. The interventions under the project have been designed targeting climate-adaptive livelihoods to address these issues and to suggest appropriate adaptation actions for reducing the vulnerabilities of coastal communities. Project partners continue to showcase high commitment towards achieving the project objectives.

The Gender-Sensitive Vulnerability Assessment study and Decision Support Tool will be used by policy makers at districts, state, and national levels for ensuring long-term sustainability. Discussions have taken place with the Ministry and National Centre on Sustainable Coastal Management for the requirement of this VA study, as all previous coastal vulnerability assessments in India have focused on physical, geographic and infrastructure related vulnerabilities rather than focusing on socio-economic parameters.

An agency has been contracted to develop a robust communication and media strategy, which will guide the national and three state PMUs for strengthening the capacity at different levels for the effective implementation of ecosystem and community-based adaptation. This will also help meet needs of the local people for better understanding of the situation and will ensure effective and efficient implementation of the project.

#### 2.2.5 Country Ownership

MoEFCC and UNDP have been working closely to ensure achievement of the expected outcomes. Institutional Mechanisms have been established at national, state and at district level to support implementation, with active community participation.

The State of Andhra Pradesh and Odisha have showcased their ownership of the project by holding preparatory planning meetings and detailing out the scope of assignments in 2021 through co-finance. The State of Maharashtra has also mobilised their co-finance share in establishing aquaculture units (procurement of equipment) in the target landscapes.

All three states have acknowledged the impacts of the pandemic causing delays to field implementation activities under Output 1 and 2. As requested by the NDA, all states have provided a draft revised implementation plan (to be approved by the Ministry) which addresses these delays and ensures the activities are implemented within the project duration. States have accelerated their efforts to ensure their committed co-finance for the project duration (as per the FAA) is also reflected in the revised implementation strategy.

#### 2.2.6 Efficiency and Effectiveness

The established Institutional and fund flow mechanisms, and commitment of all stakeholders will make the implementation of the project more efficient and effective to execute all funded activities and complete the project as per the scheduled time frame as envisaged in the FAA.

Timely contribution of co-financing commitment by Government counterparts would also be important for effective implementation of funded activities. However, delay in reporting on the co-financing commitment was experienced in 2021.

The outcome of the studies like the Vulnerability Assessment and Decision support tool will help to enhance efficiency and effectiveness of the implementation process. The comprehensive communication/media and awareness plan will help to generate awareness among various stakeholders and to establish effective communication mechanisms to facilitate learning and knowledge-exchange between communities as well as institutions.

#### Progress for the relevant reporting period

In 2020, an agency was contracted to work on the Vulnerability Assessment, however due to COVID-19, the progress under this study was delayed. During this period, the previous NDA, requested UNDP to pause the study till further notice. The inception report and methodology was submitted for review, however upon evaluation, a collective decision with the NDA was taken to terminate the existing contract, which resulted in limited implementation progress under this activity in 2021.

The NDA recommended to work with the National Centre on Sustainable Coastal Management (NCSCM) which has vast experience in conducting coastal vulnerability assessments that would lead to value addition rather than replication of national level activities.

NCSCM has submitted a proposal for review, which will be submitted to the NDA for approval. The vulnerability assessment will be initiated in the first half of 2022. The work done by the previous agency will be used as a baseline to fast track progress under the study.

#### Progress for the relevant reporting period

Despite the second wave of COVID-19 in the first half of 2021, there was progress in preparatory activities at State level. Odisha and Maharashtra are in the final stages of completion of delineation of project landscapes and identification of villages and beneficiaries.

Odisha followed a consultative process with consideration of scientific data and GIS based images for delineation of boundaries of 7 landscapes. Scientists from the technical institutes like Odisha Remote Sensing Application Centre (ORSAC), Odisha Climate Change Cell and Chilika Development Authority (CDA) and Integrated Coastal Zone Management Society (ICZM Society) were consulted. As per the suggestions of the scientists, the key parameters considered for delineation of boundaries of project landscapes are:

- High Tide Line (HTL) and Low Tide Line (LTL)
- Coastal Hazard Maps of Survey of India
- Presence of existing eco-system resources in the landscapes (mangroves, seagrass, salt marshes, watershed etc) and identification for potential patches for treatment.
- Administrative Boundary of Blocks and Gram Panchayats (GPs)
- Consideration of all villages of a Gram Panchayat and all hamlets of a Village

Similarly, landscapes will be delineated in Andhra Pradesh in 2022. Overall progress under this activity was heavily impacted by the pandemic. Progress in Odisha: i) Consultations with government and other stakeholders working in the field of climate change and allied sectors were held: Viz. departments of Agriculture, Fisheries and Animal Husbandry, to explore the potential for collaboration on the project components around Climate adaptive livelihoods, leveraging existing schemes of the department, capacity building of project staff and the project beneficiaries of the landscapes. ii) Discussions were held with Odisha University of Agriculture & Technology (OUAT) and Central Institute of Freshwater Aquaculture (CIFA) to understand their existing facilities for training and capacity building around SRI and other agricultural practices, oyster, and mussel farming. iii) Meetings were held with scientists of Chilika Development Authority and the Odisha state's climate change cell to understand key climate change related issues and to explore capacity building and knowledge sharing. iv) A consultation meeting was held with representatives of the project titled "Infrastructure for Climate Resilient Growth Program (ICRG)" to understand the best climate resilient practices being undertaken within the existing schemes of the Government such as "MGNREGA" and to acquire knowledge products, tools, studies, and explore possible collaboration. Concept Notes on various livelihood interventions (SRI, Oyster farming, Mussel farming, Ornamental fishery, mangrove, watershed, seagrass etc.) have been developed by project team.

Progress in Maharashtra: Through co-finance, there has been quite a lot of progress in the establishment of aquaculture infrastructural units. 7 Pearl Spot fish nursery units established in Sindhudurg District, 27 Sea bass cage culture units established in project districts (20 in Sindhudurg District), and 24 Units of Mussel farming and 4 units of Oyster Farming have been established.

The study identifies institutions associated or involved in work relating to the coastal system of India for future networking opportunities. The field level activities and workshops could not be held due to the pandemic and will be launched in 2022.

Maharashtra: State Project Steering committee held its first meeting on 23.08.2021 and took decision to identify institutions in Maharashtra engaged in activities relevant to this project for necessary networking and also decided to establish District Level Coordination Committees (DLCC)

Odisha: Initiated the processes for creation of a dedicated website for the project. A community mobilisation strategy is also being prepared, which would act as a guiding document for the partner facilitating NGOs to follow during rolling out the field mobilisation in the landscapes. An exposure visit for the Odisha SPMU was held between 25 October – 29 October). The team witnessed during the visit the initiatives undertaken by Mangrove and Marine Biodiversity Conservation Foundation of Maharashtra (Mangrove Foundation), Government of Maharashtra for mainstreaming conservation of coastal and marine biodiversity and improving the livelihoods of the coastal communities through conservation linked and eco-friendly interventions. In addition, initial discussions were also held with private Sector players such as HDFC bank to leverage private sector funding and for identifying potential areas for collaboration and mainstreaming of EBA concerns into their CSR policies.

2.5 Report on changes during implementation (include actual and expected changes)



As reported in the APR 2020, the Covid-19 pandemic affected the overall implementation of field level activi-ties under the project, which were then planned to be executed in early 2021. However, India was severely impacted by the second COVID wave, which resulted in further delay to field implementation. As a result, several project activities and decisions were put on hold as national and state level priorities were redirected to mitigating the impacts of the pandemic.

While there was an improvement in late 2021, the restrictions contributed to delays in conducting meetings with relevant stakeholders at national and state level. The revised implementation plan is currently being updated to consider these delays.

In 2021, there was also a change in the National Designated Authority with the appointment of Ms Richa Sharma, Additional Secretary, Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change. A few changes were suggested by the NDA which have been summarised as follows:

- 1. Fund flow mechanism: In lieu of the provision given in para 132 of Funding Proposal, as requested by the NDA, UNDP will be making direct cash advances to the three responsible parties under the pro-ject. This has been communicated to GCF in June 2021. The existing LoA with the NDA has been amended, following which LoAs were signed with the three target states for making the disburse-ment. As per the FAA, the overall responsibility of the implementation of the project lies with the Ministry and the three target states.
- 2. A few changes related to the NPMU, small changes in targeted landscapes in Maharashtra and to do with the project director in Andhra Pradesh were proposed by the NDA and these are under assessment by UNDP. Once assessed, the GCF will be notified as per the standard protocols
