TRANSITIONAL JUSTICE

Key achievements

OMP

- Archival research database: temporary database in place permanent database to be finalized by Aug 2020
- 2. Archival Team: Scanners, research consultant, archival officers to be hired -recruitment in progress (advertised)
- 3. Psychosocial support: Consultant + 2 legal consultants recruited for sensitization of OMP support officers
- 4. Referrals: numbers are yet to be received;
- 5. Technical/ infra structure support required to operationalize Mannar and Matara field offices of OMP

SCRM

- 6. Consultant recruited to support Office for Reparations
- 7. 2 International Communications consultants to be recruited as requested for the development of a communications strategy

8. Ahanna campaign: on going (financial support from UNDP) – divisional level programs conducted for awareness raising on Transitional Justice

Challenges and Risk

- 1. OMP Follow-up and establishment of monitoring mechanisms after project conclusion is difficult due to lack of government support
- Risk of the SCRM being abolished after the upcoming elections. Options to ensure sustainability
 of SCRM include facilitating linkages with the Ministry of National Integration & Reconciliation;
 Prime Minister's Office and Ministry of Resettlement
- 3. The recruitment procedure for officers cannot be cross-checked by UNDP due to the independent nature of the body
- 4. Ongoing: as the direct link is with the RCs office, most decisions are taken beyond UNDP's control
- 5. Concerns raised by the RCO due to the time consumed by UNDP in reviewing terms, steps etc.

Suggestions/ Next steps:

- 1. Bimali: *Ahanna* campaign ensure the participation of both men and women in programs in order to make their voices heard; explore the possibility of partnering with the Asia Foundation.
- 2. Nimmi: UNDP colleagues to participate in one of the programs of the Ahanna campaign.
- 3. Paavani: allocation of finances should be specified (in addition to community police); explore linkages with the mediation boards if funds are available and check the possibility of working on elections and campaigns ('know your candidate' campaigns).

<u>Reconciliation</u>

Key achievements

- 1. Work with SLIDA: incorporation of a compulsory module on social cohesion in the curriculum for cadets
- 2. 2nd module on conflict sensitivity for development projects (optional module) ongoing: modules are being reviewed; sessions were conducted in June to understand the need/ perceptions for the module
- 3. Program for SL Rupawahini Corp. officers in conflict sensitivity: 170 individuals trained; gender breakdown pending
- 4. Ex-Combatants programme: reprogrammed the finances from ONUR training to be held in end August, together with a CSO consultant recruited for this activity
- 5. National Christian Evangelical Alliance of Sri-Lanka NCEASL (CSO) Production of a Digital media tool kit for students on ethics of internet use together with UNICEF: under review

Challenges and Risk

1. Similar to TJ

Suggestions:

1. Paavani: possibility of looking at GIZ in terms of developing the curriculum, lessons learnt, best practices

International Narcotics L: (91115/96525)

Key achievements

- 1. Victim and Witnesses Protection Act: reviewed and revised draft completed handed over to the PM's office; cabinet approval received and submitted to the LDD (substantial number of recommendations in line with international standards incorporated)
- Separate Act to be drafted? for children and a separate chapter on the vulnerable including LGBTQ
- 3. The definition of victims and witnesses to be extended to include persons of non reported cases + indirect victims (protection to be requested even by a third party)
- 4. Recognition of the Women and Children's Desks at police stations as a statutory body achieved through this Act
- 5. An appeal process to be set in place for children to appeal to the Supreme Court where the lower court procedures take more than 2 years
- 6. Victimology study was the 1st qualitative study in SL covering all 25 districts. 40 cases covered per police station and 3 stations covered per district. Study findings completed and the final report is pending.
- 7. Public awareness raised on Victim and Witness Protection Act: TV, radio commercials plus three TV talk shows were supported. Results: 267 calls received to the bureau after the commercials were aired.
- 8. Module on trauma informed care for the victims of crime was developed together with the Ceylon School of Psychiatrists
- 9. Capacity development of over 1500 police officers, prison officers and NCPA officers island wide
- 10. Support provided to the Prisons Department to set up a Victim and Witnesses Protection unit within prisons

Challenges and Risk

1. Victimology study: delayed after the Easter attacks as the priority for the study was overshadowed by the necessity for defense.

Suggestions/steps forward:

- 1. Suman: Financial spot check with the Victim and Witnesses Authority chairman to be done.
- 2. Suman: a mechanism to be developed to evaluate the feedback from the trainees.
