# 5 - CHALLENGES / LESSONS LEARNT

Key challenges and remedial measures taken:

- 1. The issues and challenges reported in the July 2017 to June 2018 Project Implementation report remained valid.
- 2. The effectiveness and responsiveness of RPCU in fulfilling its coordination and technical support role hinges on the availability of its key project personnel.
- 3. The need to complete RapCAs in five countries before the end of the year has placed immense pressure on the consultant whose contract ends at the end of Q4. The IW Project Managers are essentially working on their own and require a lot of help in organising the logistics of the RapCA so two trips are required for each country- one for planning and one for the execution of the RapCA.
